Several Guilds celebrated anniversaries this year, including 1st Etobicoke Trefoil Guild (west Toronto and area) with 25 years in June.

Believe it or not, Ontario Guild membership years total 45,725 years (including girl years) for 1,314 members. That equals an average of almost 35 years of membership each! That is a lot of 1st Windsor Trefoil Guild has the only Guide Chapel in North America and supplies flowers for the alter each week. The Chapel of the Good Shepherd was dedicated by Company 3 Girl Guides of All Saints Church on June 9 1935. The chapel was created by members of Girl Guides and their families plus friends including everything from the carving of the alter and alter rails. Linens and cushions were done by the Rangers and Guiders of Windsor from all denominations. Guild members take flowers from the church (after services) and give them to former members now residing in nursing homes.
