The Story of a Guider's Dress

fter a rather long Christmas break, we arrived back in Archives to find several donations. One consisted of two large boxes of artifacts and memorabilia from a long-time Edmonton Guider. Although, often a bit routine, it is so exciting to open donations like these as we never know what will be in the box. Often the contents are common memorabilia of which we already have examples in the collection – remember there are thousands of Guiders and many collecting similar items over their Guiding careers. However, many donations include something that makes us say: "Wow, I've never seen one of those before."

One of the items in this donation was a Guider's uniform dress from the mid-1960s, known at the time as the "cocktail dress," a rather stylish, double-breasted dress intended for dual use for both Guiding and non-Guiding occasions. It wasn't in very good condition and looked identical to several others already in the collection all in good condition and most with known provenance. We almost threw it away, but we hesitated because we knew the name of the owner and this gave it a small but recognisable provenance.

However, looking at it closely we spotted that the lapels were different, pointed versus rounded on all our examples. There were no Girl Guide maker's tag and signs of repairs and modifications suggesting it might be home-made (uniform patterns were available at the time). No, the seams were definitely factory-sewn ... so we looked further. Comparison with an example we have on display revealed that the sleeves were shorter and the cuffs narrower on the donated dress. Then we noticed that the darts and seams were different, and the dress was constructed very differently. Fortunately, we have a photograph of a Guider wearing one of these dresses and - Lo and Behold - it has pointed lapels! The final clincher was the store's catalogue. Yes, there really were two different versions sold and this was the earlier one. Now it is in our permanent

collection, numbered, documented and wrapped in tissue paper in a storage box.

Likely we will probably never be able to answer the question as to why two versions of this dress were made. Did they have different manufacturer? Did GGC create a newer model based on feedback from wearers? Was it a lower cost to make the dress? Who knows?

A lot of what we do in Archives is very routine work, but occasionally there are some opportunities for detective work and the odd "Eureka moment."

Are you wondering what we do with items that really are duplicates? We try to use them for displays or educational purposes and sometimes we give them to the silent auctions at events such as the AGM to raise money for CWFF.

Eat Out

CHICKEN A LA KING (page 35) Twilight District, Prairie Rose

Ingredients

16 cups (4 L) chicken broth 2 cups sherry (optional)

10, 284 ml cans mushrooms or 2.5 kg fresh 16 cups milk mushrooms 1 clove garlic

8 kg (60 cups) cooked, cubed chicken 1 kg butter or margarine 2 cups (500 ml) green pepper, chopped 2 cups onion chopped

2 cups celery, chopped 8 cups flour

1 tbsp Worcestershire sauce Salt and hot sauce to taste

Directions:

Heat, but do not boil, the milk and broth.

Melt the butter in a large Dutch oven over medium heat. Sauté onion, celery and garlic.

(If using fresh mushrooms, sauté with onion, celery and garlic).

Add flour and slowly stir in hot liquid. Stir constantly to avoid scorching.

Put meat and green pepper into roasting pans (if using canned mushrooms, add them at this point). Add Worcestershire sauce and sherry to sauce; taste and adjust seasoning.

Pour sauce over meat. Heat in 350°F (180°C) oven until bubbling, about 1½ hours.

Serve in patty shells or over hot biscuits.

AND TO ACCOMPANY YOUR CHICKEN...

BEST EVER CORNBREAD (page 90)

Cooking method: Dutch oven Cooking time: 45 minutes

Servings: 10 - 12

Ingredients

1 cup butter, melted3 cups flour2 cups sugar2 cup cornmeal3 cups milk1 tsp salt

4 eggs, beaten 4 tsp baking powder

Directions:

In a large bowl mix together butter, eggs and milk. In a separate bowl sift together sugar, cornmeal, flour, baking powder and salt. Mix dry ingredients into wet ingredients, 1 cup at a time until well blended. Spoon mixture into a lightly greased 12-inch Dutch oven and spread evenly.

Cover Dutch oven and bake using 8 – 10 briquettes under the pot and 14 – 16 briquettes on top for 45 minutes or until cornbread turns golden brown.

For even cooking make sure to turn the oven and lid ¼ turn in opposite directions every 10 minutes.

Serve warm with honey butter.

Third Party Service Provider (TPSP) Camp

Scenario: You are completing your first year as a Guide Leader and your girls have decided that they want a wind-up camp. You have done your Safe Guide course but have never been the Responsible Guider for a camp. The unit discussed what they want to do, and they want to go to Camp Fun. The plan is to bus to camp (singing all the way), sleep in cabins (staying dry) and the meals are going to be provided by the camp (no food prep or dishes). Sounds like a hassle-free camp.

You start to look at the bus and camp booking. You call the local bus company, there is no contract required as they have dealt with Guide units many times and the dates of the camp work with their schedule. You can confirm that Camp Fun is an accredited member by checking the Alberta Camping Association. You go to Camp Fun's website to confirm availability and the activities that the girls want to do; the girls want to canoe and try archery so you call the camp and do the Third-Party Service Provider (TPSP) Interview Checklist SG.7, this confirms the qualifications of the camp's canoe and archery staff. The camp meets the SG.7 requirements and they send you their contract and you tentatively book the camp for the unit. After checking the Alberta Council website, you email this contract into Contracts North/ Contracts South based on the jurisdiction of your District.

Time to review: the bus and camp are booked, and the contract has been sent in for a signature. The next step is to fill out the Safe Guide forms for the camp. Ensure that the most recent forms are used; check the National website.

SG.1 - Make sure that the Camp Fun location data is correct, transportation data is accurate, activities list is complete and that Guider contacts have current data.

SG.4 - Use the Third-Party Service Provider resource on the Safe Guide page on the Alberta Council website and the Appendix H Emergency Response Guidelines

in Safe Guide to help complete this form. Do not forget to consider all options for this event so that every member of your unit will be able to participate, and have fun while being safe. Check that the phone numbers used are up to date and that location information is accurate so that help can get to you.

SG.3 - Make sure to mark Yellow TPSP Water Activity and use a current e-mail: this is how the assessor will be contacting you. Also, be sure to include your District on this form. All adults attending your camp must be included with their iMIS numbers provided. Make sure your first aider's qualifications are current and in iMIS or that a copy of their first aid certificate is attached with your form. Your Home Contact should be aware of their duties, review Appendix J in Safe Guide with them. Your list of activities must match what is on the SG.1. Do not forget to check off Conditional Activities TPSP boating. Fill in page two both the activity Planning Chart and the Forms for Activity Acknowledgement/Approval. By having the forms come from your e-mail and providing your iMIS number, you do not need to sign the form.

SG.5 - Only list the activities that the form applies to canoeing.

Great; the forms are done. But you do need to review them before you send them into **any-assessor@ girlguides.ca**.

Did you check your ratios? There are 3 younger siblings attending the camp as well as the unit's junior leader.

Participant numbers for this camp:

Sparks: 2 Brownies: 1 Guides: 17 Rangers: 1 Supervisors: 3 Others (specify): 0

Third Party Service Provider (TPSP) Camp continued...

With this camp there are three ratios to check:

Bus ratio:

Sparks/Brownies 1:12 Guides 1:20

Pathfinder/Ranger 1 supervisor per bus.

Two female supervisors must be on the bus, one of whom must be a Guider.

Camp ratio:

Sparks/Brownies: 1:5 Guides/Pathfinders 1:7 Rangers 1:15

2 leaders will cover 14 of the 17 Guides attending camp.

The remaining ratio can be calculated by: Sparks/Brownies 3/5 = 0.600 Remaining Guides 3/7 = 0.429 Ranger 1/15 = 0.067 0.600 + 0.429 + 0.067 = 1.096 leaders to cover the remaining girls this rounds up to 2 leaders.

You need a total of 4 leaders for the basic camp.

Boating ratio:

Sparks/Brownies 1:5 - min 3 Guides 1:5 - min 2 Pathfinders/Rangers 1:7 - min 1

Sparks/Brownies/Guides 1:5 ratio there are 20 girls this requires 4 leaders. You will need one more leader to cover the Ranger, so you need a total of 5 leaders.

TPSP staff cannot count in the ratio, so two more supervisors are necessary for the camp; either Guiders or Non-member volunteers that are in iMIS with a valid PRC. Once you have the other supervisors' names and iMIS numbers, add them to the SG.3. Then send your paperwork into any-assessor@girlguides.ca.



The Many Benefits of Guiding Resumes and Job Applications

Within Guiding, girls and Guiders develop many transferable skills that can be applied to their future education or careers. It is important on resumes, job applications and when applying for further education to highlight the many skills that Guiding builds, as those who are not in Guiding may not be aware of these. This list is taken from the Girl Guide website www.girlguides.ca, and there is more information there for when you are creating your resume or education application. Here is a sample list of skills:

For Girls:

- Leadership and self-confidence
- Teamwork and collaboration
- Working independently
- Time management
- Resilience, dedication, and perseverance (e.g. able to overcome various obstacles)
- Interpersonal skills and conflict resolution
- Flexibility and dealing with change
- Mentorship if you have worked with younger girls
- Communication
- Community service and conservation
- Event planning and execution
- Teamwork
- Time management
- Organization and prioritization
- Record keeping

For Adults (this will vary depending on what positions you have held in Guiding):

- Administrative experience
- Meeting facilitation
- Coordination and organizational skills
- Volunteer management and supervision, including monitoring and evaluating performance, recruitment, and retention
- Mentorship
- Conflict resolution,
- Strategic planning: short and long term
- Marketing/sales decision-making
- Change Management
- Financial planning and oversight
- Bookkeeping
- Record keeping
- Governance
- Organizational oversight
- Non-profit management

What does the Alberta Council Youth Forum Actually Get Up to?

Girl Guides of Canada's vision is to create "A better world, by girls," however a lot of the important decisions are made by the adults. Although, these women are amazing volunteers in which our organization could not function without, it is not embracing our Girls First vision. This is where the Alberta Council Youth Forum is introduced.

The Alberta Council Youth Forum is a group of Rangers from all over the province representing the voice of the girls in Alberta, Northwest Territories and Yukon. The idea being that every girl can be properly represented and heard. For the fourth year in a row, the Youth Forum works with ANY Council to provide feedback and work together on different projects in which are beneficial to Girl Guides. Some past successes include planning Rally Day 2019, submitting various blueprint articles and newsletters, gaining access for Rangers to MemberZone and implementing the Joyce Foster's scholarship.

This year, 6 new members were introduced! The Youth Forum welcome camp in November was held in Canmore where everyone got to know each other. Gingerbread cookies were made (and eaten) and the streets of Canmore were explored; however, work had to be done as well. We had a lovely visit from a National Youth Forum Member and Laurie, one of the

Deputy Provincial Commissioners. All the aspects of the Alberta Council Youth Forum were explained to the new members and 2020 goals were set. The Youth Forum has monthly calls so it has been nice putting some faces to a voice; the Youth Forum will meet again when participating in the Annual General Meeting and Multi-Faceted in May.

The Alberta Council Youth Forum goals for this year were split into outreach and council goals. The outreach goals include becoming more active on our Instagram, releasing 2 newsletters and going out to different events or units all to spread awareness about the Youth Forum and what we do. This is important so that we can more accurately represent girls; with outreach there's a higher chance of knowing what the girls want in their program and it also allows them the opportunity to reach out. Our Classic Sandwich cookie boxes do not have a best before stamp

CONFIRMED

The cookie boxes are actually labelled with their production date, NOT their best before date. To ensure your Girl Guide Cookies retain their optimum taste, texture and appearance, Classic Girl Guide Cookies are best within ten months of the date they were produced, while the Chocolatey Mint Cookies are best eaten within eight months of production. To determine the packaging date, please locate the production date imprinted on the end flap of the box.



If a girl is registered in April through the "Try Now, Pay Later" campaign, she must wear uniform and participate in the Spring cookie sale campaign.

Girls registered for "Try Now, Pay Later" are not required to purchase or wear BUSTED uniform. They may wear Guiding gear if they choose; these girls are not required to participate in cookie sales, and they are not eligible for Cookie All Stars. Units are encouraged to include girls in group sales events.



When I send in Safe Guide forms to the assessor for a yellow event, I need to send the SG1, SG2, SG3, SG4, kit list, menu and itinerary.

For a yellow event, you need to submit your SG1, SG3 and SG4. An SG5 would also be required if you were doing a conditional or adventurous activity and a WA.1 would be required if you were doing a water event. Ensure all forms are the current forms by checking Member Zone.



A Guider or Non-member volunteer does not have to be on the unit roster to help at an event.

Any active Guider or Non-member volunteer in iMIS that has a current PRC may help at an event.



A girl swimming in a PFD at a public pool swim makes the event yellow.



The event becomes yellow only when girls are wearing PFDs at GGC led swimming or water play.
It is not a yellow event at a public It is not a yellow event at a public pool.
