Amanda will be a first year Pathfinder as of fall 2016 and she was selected to receive this award based on her commitment to the environment through various initiatives at home, school, in Guiding and her ongoing displays of kindness and helpfulness to those around her. Specifically, Amanda teaches young students at her school about recycling programs, participates in the school juice box recycling program, looks after her household recycling (including cleaning, sorting and putting the blue bin on the curb), and has participated in many clean ups, including the Tim Horton's Clean-Up and clean up's around her neighborhood. Amanda's Guiders are proud of her achievements. They have noted many instances over the three years that she has been a Guide where she was kind to new or shy members, and helpful at district events with Brownies and Sparks. Amanda truly exemplifies what it means to be a Girl Guide, and is very deserving of this award. Congratulations Amanda!

The Cydney Weir Memorial Award is named after Cydney Weir, a girl member and Guide leader of Southern Lights District in Regina, whose enthusiasm and commitment to Guiding was tragically cut short in 2014 upon her passing. Cydney was passionate about the environment, the welfare of animals, swimming, being outdoors and she oved to camp. Her kindness shone through in all she did, and she was rarely without a smile.

The Cydney Weir Memorial Award is awarded annually to a youth member of Girl Guides who has attended at least one outdoor camping experience in the current year. 

As the new Guiding year gets into full swing many Guiders are planning fall camps, sleepovers, trips and outings. These events are a great opportunity to get to know your girls and create a team atmosphere in your unit and district, plus they are a ton of fun! When planning activities please keep in mind the Safe Guide requirements and refer to the **Activity Planning Chart** (Safe Guide page 16) to determine the activity level of your event.



REMEMBER SAFE GUIDE DEADLINES

- Green Level Activities Approval is not required
- Yellow Level Activities Your paperwork must be submitted at least 14 days before your activity.
- Red Level Activities Your paperwork must be submitted at least <u>21 days before</u> your activity.

Late submissions will not be assessed and you will be required to cancel or postpone your event.

Make sure you submit your paperwork ON TIME!

UPDATES TO SAFE GUIDE AND FORMS



- Every summer there are updates made to the Safe Guide handbook and changes made to many Safe Guide forms. This year there were changes to the **SG.2**, **SG.3** and **SG.4**.
- Please ensure you are using current forms and following the guidelines in the current handbook
- Forms and handbook can be found at http://forms.girlquides.ca/SafeGuide
- Activities cannot be assessed if submitted on old versions of forms. They will be sent back to the Responsible Guider for revision.

WHEN DO YOU NEED AN SG.5?

The SG.5 Waiver form is required for **ALL**:

- Conditional Activities (see list in Safe Guide pages 157-159)
- Adventure Activities (see list in Safe Guide page 9)

SG.4 EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN (ERP)

Don't forget to complete an SG.4 for **every** activity you do – even Green Level Activities! You should also have an ERP for your regular meeting location!

NON-MEMBER VOLUNTEERS

What is a Non-Member?

A non-member is anyone who:

- Helps in a unit during regular meetings more than twice during a Guiding year.
- Volunteers at day camps or events.
- Volunteers at overnight camps.
- Is a Treasurer (handling Girl Guides of Canada (GGC) funds).
- Is a support person who regularly accompanies a person with a disability.

ANYONE who fits in the above categories MUST:

- Provide a Police Records Check (PRC) that meets GGC standards.
- Be registered in iMIS using the Non-member Volunteer form (A.7).

<u>ARCHERY</u>

Guiders wanting to do archery must have a facilitator who has a NASP certificate entered in iMIS.

- Girls will demonstrate an increased awareness and appreciation of global issues.
- Girls will develop skills which support active engagement in issues that matter to her.
- Girls will gain a stronger awareness of their own identity and culture, by experiencing different cultures and communities.
- Girls will develop a sense of belonging to the global sisterhood embodied by WAGGGS and an understanding of the purpose, and the influence and actions that can be achieved through the collective voices within WAGGGS.

Martensville Pathfinders go to the Dominican Republic

On March 23, after 18 months of fundraising, the 1st Martensville Pathfinder Unit boarded a plane for Puerto Plata in the Dominican Republic. Four adults and 10 girls in Grades 8 and 9 went for a 12-day adventure with "Me to We". The trip was a result of the unit's discussion of service and what we wanted to do. Our unit then attended We Day in Saskatoon in November 2014 and decided to get involved.

The experience with Me to We was amazing. We were met at the airport in Puerto Plata by two facilitators from Me to We who were with us for the entire trip. A translator was also with us during the day to assist us with Spanish translations while we worked in the communities. Our days started at 8 a.m. with breakfast and ended around 9:30 p.m. after an evening of programming activities at the hotel.

On the first day, we spent time in the morning learning basic phrases in Spanish. In the afternoon we started to paint the outside of three houses in a village called Villa Samaritano. The group enjoyed working with local children who came to see what we were doing and they wanted to help us paint. We put our Spanish to use right away as we interacted with the children over the two days in the community.

The group then worked for the rest of the time primarily in the community of El Batey de la Union and assisted with the foundation of the high school. All of the work is done manually, with no assistance by machinery. We worked at a variety of things such as shovelling and moving dirt and gravel via wheelbarrow, cutting re-bar.



joining re-bar together, and moving the re-bar structures to where they would be installed.

We also had the opportunity to participate in a few amazing activities. We went on a walking tour of the El Batey de la Union community and then it was Canada vs the Dominican in a baseball match with our group playing with children from the community. We lost but we sure had a lot of fun!

On Easter Sunday we went into Puerto Plata and took a cable car up an enormous mountain where we were able to enjoy an incredible view of the city. On top of the mountain we took a hike on the paths to see an ancient cave dwelling of the indigenous Taino people, a rustic casita (small house) that was used many years ago, and a Laguna.

We also had an opportunity to stop at Project Esperanza, a nonprofit initiative started by an American university student to help Haitian immigrants in the Dominican. We were given a Spanish cooking lesson where we made suk suk bon bon, a treat similar to a donut. We finished off our trip with a day of fun, exploring a monkey jungle, doing a seven station 4,500 foot zip line course, and swimming in the ocean.

The experience was very rewarding and humbling for the entire group. We all gained a deeper appreciation for the little things that we take for granted every day, such as clean drinking water. We are grateful to everyone in our community who supported us during our fundraising activities – food concessions, bottle drives and selling yummy Girl Guide cookies. Each girl sold approximately 40 cases of cookies as part of their fundraising goal. We also thank the Martensville Kinsmen, Martensville Affinity Credit Union, the Bessborough Hotel and the Western Development Museum Festival of Trees for their donations.



Melfort Rangers' trip to Europe

What an amazing trip this was! The Melfort Rangers left Saskatchewan on July 8 and travelled to London, England; Paris, France; Adelboden and Lucerne, Switzerland; and Florence and Rome, Italy. We joined a Girl Scout Tour through EF Tours. There were 45 Girl Guides and Girl Scouts all together from Texas, Colorado, New York, and Saskatchewan on this tour of a lifetime.

We flew into London, threw our bags in the hotel, and immediately headed out to see the sights! There was so much to see in so little time! We saw Big Ben, the Parliament buildings, London Bridge, Tower Bridge and Windsor Castle. We rode the London Eye, and cruised on the Thames River. We were pinned the pinning ceremony at Pax Lodge. We took a Harry Potter Walking Tour, and went to the amazing musical in London, "Wicked"!

Then we traveled to Paris by Eurostar train. We were able to tour Versailles. It is so beautiful; everything is gold! We saw the Eiffel Tower, and we went up the only sky scraper in Paris – Tour Maine-Montparnasse, and the view was spectacular. We visited the Louvre and saw the Mona Lisa, the Winged Victory of Samothrace, Venus de Milo, and so much more! And we went into the Notre Dame Cathedral.

Then we travelled by bus to Adelboden, Switzerland. It's was so beautiful in Switzerland. We went to Our Chalet, and had a pinning ceremony and toured the grounds. Then we hiked up the mountain to a magic tree. The next day we travelled to Lucerne, Switzerland and went up Mount Pilatus, and had a Swiss Folklore evening. The scenery in Switzerland was incredible from the high mountains, to the beautiful lakes – everything was so picturesque.



Then it was off to Italy where we saw the leaning Tower of Piza, and travelled to Florence. There we visited the Duomo, participated in a fresco art workshop, and learned about real leather. Then it was off to Rome to see the Roman Colosseum and the Roman Forum. We toured the Vatican City and saw the Sistine Chapel and St Peter's Basilica.

It was a whirlwind 15 days. There was so much history, arts and culture to see. It is hard to imagine that some of these sites that we saw are older than the country we live in!

A life changing trip to Ecuador!

I had the privilege of travelling to Ecuador, South America in July 3 -15, 2016. I was one of nine Red Wing Trex girls and three Guiders who flew with "Free the Children" to volunteer and learn high up in the Andes Mountains and deep in the Amazon Rainforest. We all learned so much and we also gained a new appreciation for loving families and a place to call home, education and the ability to earn a living, agriculture and good food, clean water and toilet paper! We are grateful for what we have and hope to continue to make a difference in our world!

During the hour and a half drive to the Saskatoon Airport, I was anticipating my very first flight, and recalling the Trex fundraisers that made this trip possible, some of which included online auctions, a trade show, pizza



sales, a water walk, collecting stamped receipts, and selling enormous amounts of Girl Guide cookies! At the airport everyone was feeling some degree of nerves and excitement, and we took off, flying from Saskatoon to Toronto, San Salvador and finally, Quito, the capital of Ecuador. We met our amazing Me to We facilitators, Michelle and Daisy, who accompanied us everywhere on our Ecuador adventure. After a good sleep in our Quito hotel, we toured around the older part of Quito. What a beautiful city! I learned that if I had lived in Quito many years ago, as the second daughter, I would have been a nun! We also visited the Equator where we did some interesting experiments.


The next day, a 7-8 hour bus trip took us up to Chimborazo province. Our accommodations were set on the edge of a mountain overlooking a small town. There were beautiful trees and flowers and incredible views everywhere. During our time there, we volunteered in a community called Shuid that was near the top of the mountain. We helped build a high school and our work included sifting sand, carrying rocks up a long, very steep hill, and making bricks using sand, straw, water and cement. The local people were using our dried bricks to build the school. We worked with a woman who raises Guinea pigs... a delicacy in Ecuador and we

also helped a woman harvest her mountainside wheat field by hand and plant her next crop. It was amazing to see how hard the women work for their families and sad to realize that they are not yet considered equal to men. We learned some basic Spanish phrases and went to a local market, having been given a normal day's wage, to see if we could buy enough food to feed a make believe family. That was an eye opener! We really enjoyed visiting a girls' group and the women's group. They make iewelry and clothing and sell them to earn extra income for their families, and they taught us to make bracelets. We also had the opportunity to shear sheep and use the wool to weave. We were sad to say good-bye to Chimborazo.

The next day our bus driver drove us down the narrow mountain roads and all the way to the Amazon. There we transferred our backpacks to a large canoe, which took us down the Napo River, deep into the Amazon Rainforest. We stayed at Minga Lodge, an absolutely breath-taking facility built right in the jungle. We were

surrounded by amazing jungle plants, trees and many lovely bugs! Our guide, Henry, shared his incredible knowledge of the jungle. He taught us many things about the Amazon and even gave us the chance to see finger monkeys! During our time there, we visited a coffee bean farm, tried many fresh fruits, visited a traditional healer, went on nature walks, visited the local community close to Minga Lodge, attempted to use a blow gun and a spear, went to a cacao bean farm, made our own chocolate (which was delicious) and were challenged to eat banana grubs, which we collected from dead trees. Some of the girls were brave enough to eat them raw! Almost all of us ate them cooked. They were surprisingly good.

Our trip to Ecuador ended much too soon. Before we knew it, we had to say adios to Michelle, Daisy and Henry and fly home. We all learned so much and came back to Canada realizing how much we have compared to the community we left behind. We are very blessed and therefore we have a responsibility to continue to improve our world. This trip was exciting, challenging and life-changing. It was amazing to be a part of a team, working together to make a difference in the world. I am sure we all miss being higher than the clouds, helping to better a community, laughing so hard our stomachs ache as we attempt to learn Spanish, jamming out to music on the bus for hours, eating the most delicious fruits, overcoming challenges and being in the most beautiful place on Earth. Thank you to Girl Guides and Free the Children for an amazing experience!

While travelling in Ontario last summer, we encountered a couple of "Little Libraries" - wondrous little book nooks made from birdhouses, old shelves, mailboxes, etc. The idea is that you borrow or exchange a book for one inside the Little Library. **Saidai,** my daughter, was quite taken by this idea and wanted to know why she had never seen one of these around home. I posed the question to her, "Why not make one of your own?"

This summer, with a little help from friends and family, we acquired a metal newspaper bin and her dad drilled and installed a latch. Saidai sanded, spray-painted, and siliconed the box until she thought it was fit for books. Then with permanent markers we added a few decorations and a catchy little rhyme: "Need a book? Take a book. Love a book? Leave a book." She had already selected a spot near the local post office and approached town council about putting it there (no easy task for my shy girl, even though her dad is on council).



The next step was to add books. Saidai has sold over 30 cases of cookies for the last two years, and had \$150 in Coles gift cards still unspent. 



Backpacking to Grey Owl's Cabin

On August 25 five excited women and their two leaders, Carla and Heather, headed out to practice what we learned at the Bear Necessities OAL training course we attended in May. For many of us, it was our first time backpacking. With packs full of gear and food, we made our way to our first camp. We got there just before it started to rain, so we quickly set up camp. After enjoying a delicious supper and spending some time reviewing the day and discussing the next day's hike, we headed to bed fairly early.

The next day was a bit more challenging as we worked our way along the trail because there were so many trees that had fallen across it. It took a bit of work to climb over and under the mess, but it was great for our cores! The weather was perfect for hiking – not too hot and not too cold. Along the way to Northend Camp-ground, we were surprised by a pack of wolves! It was an adrenalin filled experience that brought about some good laughs after. Once we arrived at our destination and set up camp, we went for a swim in Kingsmere Lake and enjoyed some time on the beach in the sun. After that, we ate supper. We learned very quickly that every meal ends up being big because carrying out rehydrated food is heavier than carrying in the dehydrated food. We definitely didn't go hungry! Our evening consisted of some training as we worked to make a fire using batteries and steel wool. The result was an opportunity to sit by the fire to debrief. It was an excellent way to end the day!

In the morning, after a scrumptious breakfast, we hiked out to Grey Owl's cabin without our heavy packs. It was an easier hike as a result. When we arrived at the cabin, our efforts in planning, training, and doing were rewarded by the beauty and tranquility of being in the middle of the bush. The warmth of the sun was an added bonus as we relaxed on the grass beside the cabin. Some of the ladies did some yoga while others rested and got lost in their own thoughts. We got back to Northend Campground, ate lunch, took down our camp, and headed to our next stop. It seemed less difficult passing over the same terrain a second time. It's quite likely that our relatively relaxing time at Northend Campground is the reason for that. At Sandy Beach (it is more rocky than sandy), we did some more practice with starting a fire using a striker. We weren't having much luck

chatting around the fire before bed.







until we used cotton balls with petroleum jelly on them. It lit immediately! We spent another fabulous evening

Our final day of hiking went quite well. We thought it was going to take a long time to get through the mess of fallen trees, so we left early and we prepared ourselves mentally for the challenge ahead. As we hiked along, we were thinking that it was easier than it had been a couple of days before. Once we realized the park's people had been through cutting out the trees, we understood why. As a result, we made good time. We got to our pick up point about half an hour earlier than expected. That was with a fairly long lunch and a detour to see how construction was looking on the road and parking area at the original trailhead. Our pontoon ride was waiting for us near where we had been dropped off, so we climbed on and headed out. After unpacking group gear and changing our clothes so we wouldn't smell as bad as we did in our hiking clothes, we went for ice cream in Waskesiu. It was a wonderful way to end our four days and three nights together!

If you are thinking about taking your unit backpacking or on a canoe trip, or if you have some other personal reason for wanting to learn more about adventure camping, it is absolutely worth registering the next time you see an opportunity for an OAL training. Carla and Heather have many years of combined experience and knowledge to pass along; it is wonderful spending time with like-minded women, gaining knowledge and experience; it is an excellent way to build your confidence so you can share it with others; and being in nature is so refreshing. Good times!


Cookie Chatter

With the leaves starting to fall and the wind beginning to blow cooler, it means one thing is on my mind – cookies! Mint cookies are being delivered in Saskatchewan between September 19 and September 24. For new Guiders, thinking about selling cookies may be daunting, but the Unit Guider is essential to the Girl Guide cookie fundraising program. As a Unit Guider, your responsibilities include:

- Keeping track of cookie finances there can be a lot of money exchanging hands at cookie time and it is important to keep good records.
- Introducing the cookie program to the girls in your unit (and to their parents) and explaining the importance of Guiding's official fundraiser. They will sell more cookies if they understand how important cookies are to their unit!
- Reviewing all deadlines and cookie-related materials to make sure you know what is happening with the cookie campaign.

Cookie Delivery and Storage

Although your cookies will have arrived by the time you are reading this, I would like to share some reminders about how to store your cookies:

- Ensure your storage space is clean, dry, and protected. The storage location should be free of chemicals, paint, or any solvent producing an odour that could be absorbed by the cookies. Keep cookies away from potential infestations (insects, rodents, etc.).
- Keep cases dry and away from moisture of any kind. Beware of bare cement floors that may transfer moisture to the carrying cartons and cause weakness.
- Keep cookies away from heat. Do not store in vehicles or outdoors. Mint cookies should be stored at a temperature between 10°C and 22°C.

Cross-campaign Cookie Selling

In the past, I have been asked about selling sandwich cookies in the fall, or mint cookies in the spring. Now that all cookies have an eight month shelf life, official guidelines have been created regarding selling cookies outside of the current campaign.

"Girl Guides of Canada wants to promote the uniqueness of each cookie campaign so we do not openly promote the selling of cookies from the previous campaign. However, it is acknowledged that there may be some cookies left over from the previous campaign that are still within the acceptable eight month selling window. As long as these have been correctly stored in a cool dry location, they are permitted to be sold. The open promotion of these cookies or stockpiling for the purpose of selling in the next campaign is not encouraged or recommended. Marketing and PR should be concentrated on the current campaign cookies only."

So basically, it is fine to sell the cookies from the previous campaign, but the focus should be on the cookies from the current campaign. As always, if you have any questions about cookies, don't hesitate to contact me!

Have the parent complete the regular registration form for girls: A.5P (application form), H.1 (health form), and IR.1 (image release form if the girl is new to Guiding and hasn't completed one before). Be sure to indicate LONES in big letters on the top of each form. The cost is \$135, the same as any girl registration. Forms will be accepted at any of the area or provincial offices. We will assign one or more Lone Guiders to work with the Lone girl.




