Girls First!

What a whirlwind of activity over the past few months for me as PC! It has been exhilarating, exciting and I will admit, somewhat exhausting!

The highlight of the past few months had to be the opportunity to present the awards at the Youth Recognition Ceremony at the end of October. It was a great honour to present Canada Cords, Chief Commissioner Awards, and Community Service Awards. There were also two Bronze Duke of Edinburgh awards awarded that day. The short biographies on the girls truly highlighted what talented, gifted and service minded young women we have in our organization. I am always amazed at what the youth of today can accomplish for themselves and for their communities.

I did take the opportunity at that event to highlight some opportunities that I would like our youth members to consider over the next few months. I would also like to let you know of these opportunities so that you can encourage girls to apply or participate.

The National Youth Council applications have just closed but there will be a yearly opportunity to apply. Something to consider for fall 2017! Girls selected on the Youth Council will be asked to advise, assist and help provide direction for the National GGC Board of Directors to ensure that the organization is engaging our youth in how they want to be engaged.

Also at the National level, there will be a conference held April 21-23, 2017 in Toronto for girls aged 16 plus. There is an anticipated onsite

attendance of 125 youth members and 25 nonmembers and an additional 150 offsite youth members. The offsite participants will be engaged via online opportunities and social media. The participants will be selected to represent a varied demographic of age, locations, and experience in the organization. The focus of the event will be to engage our youth members in what they need and what they want from Girl Guides of Canada. It will be a great place for girls to learn more about Girl Guides of Canada as well as a way for the organization to learn more from the girls. I encourage girls from Saskatchewan to apply whether they would like to travel to Toronto or if they would like to try the offsite opportunities. More information about the event and the application will be posted shortly!

Our current Youth Forum Adviser, Desire White, has been tasked with searching for 3rd year Pathfinder and Ranger aged girls who could take a lead on establishing our first Saskatchewan Girl Guides Youth Forum. Our hope is that this will be a working committee which will advise and consult with the Provincial Council on matters pertaining to youth in our province. Watch your email, social media and website for more info!

I love the direction in which the organization is moving as we recognize the importance of making the girls active participants in the program. They are not only the future leaders of GGC or in their communities, they are our CURRENT leaders! Let's provide opportunities for all our youth members, from Sparks through Rangers, to make decisions, to provide direction on what they are interested in from the program and to allow them to take the lead on those initiatives. What better way to develop girls to be confident, resourceful, and courageous than by facilitating those skills at all ages and levels. Remember to put the Girls First!

The Canadian World Friendship Fund is maintained through voluntary contributions from members and friends of Guiding, to help our members to experience Guiding internationally. It offers financial assistance to adult members who have been selected to accompany girls on nationally sponsored trips, to members attending international Guiding events as GGC representatives, and to girls and adults from other Guiding countries visiting Canada for special events.

Get girls involved in planning and running a fundraiser for CWFF. Here are some ideas to get you started:

- Host a unit-run book sale or rummage sale.
- Collect bottles and cans.
- Invest in a cute piggy bank. Challenge girls to find and bring nickels, dimes and quarters to "feed to" the bank.
- Collaborate with the units in your district to run a carnival, karaoke night, or community bingo.
- Spend an afternoon baking with your girls, and then run a bake sale.

Each member is challenged to contribute \$5 to the CWFF each year.





Program updates from National

As you may have read in the fall issues of *GuidePost*, National has launched several new programs!

- The new National Service Project Action on Poverty was launched in September. See page 13 in this issue of the *Prairie Lily* for more information.
- Girls Count, a Financial Literacy Challenge, was also launched in September. With the completion of the pilot last year, the new program is now readily available for all branches. Click on Girls Count or go to the national program website.
- In October the new Be You Challenge was launched, and it aims to help girls build their self-acceptance and self-esteem. This replaces the old Love Yourself Challenge. Be You is fully updated and was developed once again with support from NEDIC. Crests for these Challenges are available at the GGC online store.







This year National has not produced a Friendship Flyer for World Thinking Day (WTD) 2017. Instead, as WAGGGS has put together a great WTD resource for the theme of growth, National will be actively promoting that program instead of creating their own. It's a great opportunity for us to integrate WAGGGS programming into our GGC programs. (See the cover of this *Prairie Lily*.)



NEW National Service Project: Action on Poverty

The new National Service Project (NSP), which will run over the 2016-17 and 2017-18 Guiding years, is "Action on Poverty". This is the first time

that each year of the NSP will have a distinct focus within the overarching theme of poverty. This Guiding year, we will be focusing on homelessness and then in year two (2017-2018) we will be focusing on hunger.

Take Action

For the first year of the NSP as we focus on homelessness, we have three exciting service activities for girls to participate in: Keep Someone Warm; Volunteer; and Make-A-Difference Bags. Each one is described in detail on the NSP website: https://nsp.girlguides.ca and several options for ways to get involved are provided there.



In order to earn the Action on Poverty crest, girls need to complete a service activity and log their actions. To do this, simply go onto the NSP website, click on the activity that you did, and find the 'log your action' buttons on the right-hand side of the page. If the service is completed as a unit, then the Guider can log on behalf of the entire unit. It is important to log your actions, because when girls and units log their actions we can see clearly the collective impact that Girl Guides of Canada is having across the country.



Take it Further

What makes the NSP unique from other programs is the opportunity for service learning. Service learning involves learning about a topic and building understanding about it before taking action. This allows girls to better understand why they are completing a particular service activity and the impact it has. While the Instant Meeting activities created by the Program team at National are not a required component of the NSP, by using them you can help girls have a more rewarding and fulsome experience.



Make a Difference Bag

It is completely up to each Guider to determine which, how many, and how they will incorporate these Instant Meeting activities into their unit meeting. As well, the instant meeting is not a requirement for earning the Action on Poverty crest, however, we would encourage as many Guiders to include these activities in their meetings as possible so girls build an understanding of the complexities surrounding poverty and to have the opportunity to build empathy and break stigma.

Before You Start

Before you choose your service activity, make sure that you have touched base with the charity, non-profit or organization that you would like to support. It is important to make sure that the service activity that you would like to do is something that meets a need. If you need any help finding an organization to work with, please contact one of your NSP Agents (see below), and we'd be more than happy to give you a hand!

Saskatchewan has four friendly NSP Agents who are ready to provide whatever information and assistance you may need in order to offer this valuable service learning opportunity to your unit or Trefoil Guild. As well, we'd love to see pictures and hear about your unit's experience participating in the challenge!

SunRidge cares: a service sleepover

On October 14, over 60 girls from Sparks to Pathfinders attended a district sleepover hosted by SunRidge District. At the sleepover, the girls participated in their choice of service projects, completed some random acts of kindness, and everyone participated in the Regina Food Bank Drive.

We began by giving the girls some options ahead of time so that they could select which service projects were most important to them. Here is our collective impact from the service projects:

- For Keeper of the Stars, a local parrot rescue, we created approximately 40 enrichment toys for the special birds in their care.
- For Regina Cat Rescue, we created over 30 cat toys for the furry friends looking for forever homes.
- In conjunction with Camions of Care, we assembled over 200 feminine hygiene kits for shelters to have available for women in need.
- We decorated over 200 cookies, attached thank you notes to them, and delivered them to emergency services including fire halls, police services, Mobile Crisis Services, nursing staff in hospital emergency departments, the mother and baby unit, and EMS.

Another project that we completed throughout the day was empowering the Guides and Pathfinders to lead Random Acts of Kindness with the Sparks and Brownies. They created and decorated kindness postcards, assembled treat bags, and tied notes around bottles of bubbles and flowers before setting out in the community to brighten the days of our neighbours. We randomly distributed the items around the neighbourhood, just to make someone else smile.

We wrapped up our day together by collecting donations for the Food Bank Drive.

Over and over, we heard girls proclaim that they were enjoying the projects and that it was the "best sleepover ever"! As Guiders, we enjoyed the amount of enthusiasm and engagement that the girls displayed. It gave the girls more confidence in themselves and it motivated them to be kind to one another and others. It was so exciting to see the girls smiling so widely and having such fun building a strong community bond. We hope that the girls will continue to give back to the community and take pride in their role in making the world a better place.

It is great fun and a wonderful service project. Give the seniors a simple star craft or love box you have made. They will cherish your gifts.



Star Craft: Guider makes small star craft template. Girls trace and cut two stars onto fun foam and decorate with stickers or metallic pens. Make a slit from tip of one point to middle on one star. Make a slit from between two points to middle of other star. Slide stars together at slits. Punch a hole in point of one star. Hang with yarn. Make small stars to hang on tree or as tray favours in senior's home.

Bells: Four sets of hand bells were purchased with donations in memory of Nina Smith, a former Punnichy Guider. They are stored at the Area Offices and can be borrowed by any unit. They are colour-coded, kid friendly with laminated sheets of music. Try *Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star, Joy to the World* or *Jingle Bells*.



Ribbon Dancing: Girls of all ages love to use ribbon sticks in creative movement and they can be used at Enrolments, concerts, sleepovers, camps, or Guide's Own. Make sticks with crepe paper or surveyor's tape, duct taped to a pencil crayon. The ribbon should be as long as a girl's arm outstretched to reach to the floor for easy movement. Use any kind of music to suit your theme. Try the songs: *It Came Upon a Midnight Clear, White Christmas, Away in a Manger* or *Silver Bells*.

Here are some basic movements. Work each motion about 20 seconds. Adapt to music. The Guider demonstrates and calls out basic bolded words, then the girls do their own dance.

- Swings: use shoulder, back and forth, like going to school and coming back along same path.
- **Tummy:** in front motion, from side to side, waist high.
- Bottom: behind back, waist height, from side to side.
- Clean your shoes: swing low across feet, from side to side.
- Rainbows: overhead, side to side, look up.
- **Swings:** both arms swing beside the body, up and down.
- Circles: work from shoulders, make big circles.
 - **1.** Draw a <u>circle in front</u> of the body, try right hand; then change to left.
 - 2. Draw a circle overhead on ceiling.
- **Snakes:** Work from wrist only, move away so snake won't bite, through grass up and down, and sideways.

Painting Windows: Pathfinders and Rangers can paint a Christmas scene in the window of a local business. Great service and PR, too!

Love Box Craft: (For Christmas, Valentine's or Mother's Day) Supplies needed: very small box or styrofoam cube or block of wood, thin ribbon (about one m. per box), wrapping paper, scotch tape, love poem, scissors, hole punch. With scissors cut a piece of wrapping paper to cover empty

Canadian Red Cross First Aid & CPR



Adults and girls 14 years old and over

Emergency First Aid covers the basics including how to respond, the EMS system, airway emergencies such as choking, breathing emergencies such as asthma and anaphylaxis along with circulation emergencies including cardiac arrest, stroke, and deadly bleeding.

Emergency First Aid is required for some Safe Guide yellow activities such as those involving specialized equipment, sleepovers, and outdoor cooking.

This course will use a "blended learning" format. Before the course, complete the first aid theory online at your own pace and when you have free time (approximately four hours). You can access the course anywhere via the internet. When you've completed the online portion, you print out a certificate and bring it to the half day hands-on skills portion of the course.



OAL Adventure Training – Bagwa Loop Canoe Trip September 3 - 5, 2016

Hopefully you have heard the stories of our previous adventures: hiking to Grey Owl's Cabin, canoeing from Saskatoon to Batoche, as well as winter camping at Duck Mountain. As with our previous adventures, we met the day before our trip began so that we would be able to be off first thing in the morning. We had been watching the weather closely, and with a strong head wind gusting up to 39 km/h, we launched from the Narrows on Waskesiu Lake. I soon realized that we would not be making it to our destination of Bagwa Lake that day.



We stuck near the shore where the wind was not as strong. Even so, I was happy when we got into a bay and we received much needed shelter out of the wind. We stopped for lunch in the quiet bay, and we forgot about the whitecaps. Even though it was not an established campground, the place we stopped became our home for the night. Once our food was safe in a self-made bear cache (this was another adventure!), we fell asleep to trees creaking in the strong winds.



The next morning was slightly calmer, and we headed out with a bag of gorp each for a breakfast snack. When we reached Kingsmere Lake, the wind was still blowing strongly and the white caps were large. We set up camp at Southend, and had a large and delicious brunch. Then we hiked around the area and to the Warden Station.

The last day, as usual, was the nicest. We had a leisurely paddle back to the Narrows. The lake was like glass, though the wind did pick up through the morning.

We were a little disappointed that we did not actually get to our destination – Lily, Claire and Bagwa Lakes, but we had fun, we were not exhausted, and we learned a whole lot. There is always next year to canoe The Loop!

Despite the pfd that did not get packed, the toilet bag left behind at the emergency camp spot, and a few other minor mishaps, we all enjoyed the trip... It is not one we will forget soon! "It's all about the journey..."

A few basic things about the Media

"Media" stands for print media (newspapers, magazines, newsletters, etc...) and electronic media (radio, television, cable, video images). Communication with, and preparing for dealing with, media will depend on what form of the media you approach.

The media covers lots of "stories". Your event or activity is one of many they might be interested in covering. Don't expect the media to cover your event just because it took place. Understand that the media may not always be able to cover every event, no matter how newsworthy. A "last minute" major news breaking story which developed just before your event may be "bad news" – for your event's chance of getting covered. However, there are ways to enhance your chance of being "covered". Here are some basic rules.



- Media do look for "good" stories. Bad news all the time can be depressing. Your "good news" story might be just the "balance" the media are waiting for on the day of your event!
- <u>REMEMBER</u> 'Make News Media exist to cover news'. What is it about your event that makes it news? Or, even better, what can you do to *make your event news?*



To make sure these are accounted for, you will need to enter the case amount under the fall campaign field titled "Surplus/ Wish List". By including your spring case amount in this field this will ensure that the cases are included in your total case amount so that they are available to be allocated under the girl selling amounts.

Cookie Tracker

IMPORTANT – using the online Cookie Tracker does not automatically register you for Cookie All Stars. To register for Cookie All Stars units must use the actual Cookie All Stars site in spring 2017.

The Cookie Tracker tool has the functionality to transfer sales information directly to the Cookie All Stars site. This functionality has been provided as a way for Guiders to save time with cookies' administration – and to keep their mint sales organized. However using it does not mean that the unit is entered for Cookie All Stars, and it is important to take the time to ensure that the information transferred over.

Thank you to all who have taken the time to reach out with questions! I know that the mint cookie campaign this year was incredibly successful, with cookies going very quickly, something that is a testament to your organization and dedication. Saskatchewan Lones

Welcome to Guiding in our many seasons this autumn. Just in October and November, we've experienced fall, winter, and spring weather. For my Guide/Pathfinder/Ranger group, we did fall hiking in the deep snow in October under the threat of rain. I guess we'll need to record it as a "fall-into-winter with a little bit of spring" hike.





We've had a change in Lone leaders. Presently Jess is our only active Lone Guider with one Lone Brownie. We say thank you to Jackie for her leadership over the years. I've received inquiries about two potential Lone Sparks and one potential Lone Brownie. I am presently recruiting a Lone Guider for Sparks and one for Brownies in anticipation of our potential Lone members. Thank you to all of you who have passed on the information about Lone Guiding to those who are in need of this type of Guiding.

I would like to clear up a misunderstanding concerning which unit a Lone girl belongs to. I will use the example of Jacqueline, a Lone Ranger who lives in Meadow Lake. [Note: This is just an example. There is no Lone Ranger in Meadow Lake, and Jacqueline is not a real Ranger in Meadow Lake.]

- When Jacqueline registers as a Lone Ranger, she registers with the province of Saskatchewan in the same way that all our girls register. The exception is that she notes on her registration that she wants to be a <u>LONE</u> RANGER.
- Once Jacqueline's registration, health form, image release form, and fee are received by provincial Guiding, Jacqueline is registered in the 1ST SASKATCHEWAN LONES GUIDING UNIT, and I am notified to arrange for a Lone Guider to work with Jacqueline.
- The other registered girls in her town belong either to the 1st or to the 2nd Meadow Lake Guiding Unit, Prairie to Pine District, Bridging Rivers Area, Saskatchewan Council, Girl Guides of Canada.
- Jacqueline does not belong to these other designations based on town, district and area. She simply is a member of the 1st SK Lones Guiding Unit, Girl Guides of Canada. She does not belong to a district or an area.
- While she belongs to this provincial unit, she can join in the special activities of any unit that invites her to attend. If the 2nd Meadow Lake Guiding Unit is holding a fall outdoor day or a special Christmas gettogether at the swimming pool, Jacqueline can be invited to join the girls from that unit. If the Ranger Unit in Goodsoil or in Saskatoon invites Jacqueline to its enrolment or reaffirmation ceremony or to a winter camp, Jacqueline can choose to join them. Even with joining in these activities, Jacqueline remains solely a member of the 1st Saskatchewan Lones Guiding Unit, Girl Guides of Canada.

Remember, LONES is an option for girls who are unable to attend regular meetings due to distance from a regular unit, health challenges, studies or physical challenges. As Lones, girls continue in Guiding by working long distance with a Guider. Lones earn badges, do service projects, play games and participate in fun activities. Lones take part in camps, trips, selling cookies and in special events. They receive regular packages by email and/or regular mail and have regular contact with their Lone Guider.






As you may know, awards and recognition can be a very important tool for the retention of adult members within Guiding. A little bit of appreciation goes a long way, and awards are a great way to let those you work with know how wonderful they are!



Formal awards can (and should) be granted throughout the year, and can be a fantastic platform to recognize our adult member's contribution to Guiding. Informal recognition should also be ongoing. **Any** member may nominate any member at any time – it does not need to occur at year-end, and it does not need to be initiated by a commissioner. National has set a guideline that about 20% of each province's members should be recognized in any given year. To this end, there are a wide variety of awards available for Adult Members of Girl Guides of Canada.

I would like to focus a spotlight on a provincial award – the Saskatchewan Guider Appreciation Award. In order to be eligible for this award, a Guider:

- Must be a registered adult member of GGC.
- Has demonstrated qualities of measurable service and has been conscientious in her duties beyond expectations for her position.
- Has created a positive impact to our girls and Saskatchewan Guiding.



- Complete an application form (R.3P).
- Obtain a letter of support.
- Submit the application form and supporting letter, along with an iMIS profile (available from your Area Office) and send to the council concerned for approval.

Once approved, the award pins are available from Provincial Council.

For more information on this or other awards which are available, the processes for applying, or a template for letters of recommendation, please email Megan at meganl@sasktel.net. As some awards need a fair bit of lead time (up to three months), it is good to get in touch as soon as possible.
