SPRING TENT CAMP

In May 2015, the 285th Calgary Guides did their spring tent camp at Bow Valley Provincial Park, less than an hour west of Calgary. Campsites in the Alberta provincial parks are reservable on a 90 day booking system online. Loop A of the campground has an isolated cluster of 4 tenting sites (19-22), with their own outhouse and potable water tap nearby. Each site has its own fire ring and picnic table, and a level spot to pitch a 6-8 person tent. The lack of refrigeration capability made for some valuable discussions about meal planning leading up to camp. The sites are heavily treed with spruce and pine, and the river across the road provides a lovely sound with lots of wildlife. However, the close proximity of a railway bridge made for an inconveniently early wake-up call on Saturday morning...there had better have been a bear on that bridge for the engineer to lean on the horn at 5:45am like that!!!

We spent the camp working on the Basic Camper badge; the girls also chose to work on their Naturalist Badge (for Beyond You program area). Friday night we arrived and set up the tents, did our camp orientation and rules, did mug-up, and went to bed. Saturday morning we were up bright and too early!!! We made pancake breakfasts on the Coleman stoves, cleaned up, and headed out for a nature hike. A 10 minute walk got us to the campground amphitheatre, and the head of the 1km Moraine Trail. This trail lead to our destination for the morning, Middle Lake, a small kettle lake with a 2.5km interpretive trail on the far side. A gentle climb up through mixed forest, with numerous interpretive markers along the way, gave ample opportunities to learn about local landforms and history while we caught our breath and had a drink.

Middle Lake has its own day-use area, with picnic tables and an outhouse building. After a bathroom stop, we continued around the interpretive trail loop. Brochures for this loop can be picked up at the park visitor centre or downloaded on-line. The stops along the loop encouraged the girls to use their senses to note their surroundings and the goings-on of the local plant and animal life, the effects the glaciers had on moulding the landscape around them, and the effects of humans on the area.


By the time we finished the loop, we were all ready for a rest and a snack at one of the shaded picnic tables at the day-use area. An open field with bushes and trees around the perimeter was perfect for a game of Predator and Prey; while the girls were eating and having a discussion about camouflage, tracking, and stalking, one of the Guiders went out and set up the food and water stations for the game. 45 minutes of running and hiding in the growing heat was about all we were interested in, so we packed up and hiked back to the campsite for some build-your-own bunwiches for lunch.

We were ready for some resting time, so the girls sat down with some local nature guides to research 3 mammals, birds, plants, or bugs that live in the area, and the life cycle of one of those 3. We made a hat craft, and each patrol of girls set up and played their own Kim's game of found nature items. After a snack, we all retreated to our tents for some quiet time...though not many girls were content to be quiet! After rousing

them with a fire drill, we made supper of mac and cheese, wieners, and frozen mixed vegetables (what can say, the girls chose the meals!).

After supper, we walked back to the amphitheatre, where the girls spent a pleasant hour creating Be Prepared skits about camp and fire safety. By the time we walked back to camp, we were all getting exhausted! We decided on an early and brief campfire and mug-up, and were in our tents right at dark.

Sunday morning was the usual get up, eat up, and pack up! After Guides' Own, the girls played Camouflage while waiting for their parents to arrive. We all agreed that it was a successful camp, and a wonderful campsite!

There is a reduced fee if girls join after the January 31st count date.



The same registration fee applies if registration is after the January 31st count date. All registration forms must be to your iMIS home prior to this date for the official count. All

registration forms should go to the iMIS home as soon as they are completed.



- Creating a logolcrest for an event does not require provincial approval if the trefoil is not used.



_ Any logolcrest requires provincial approval before use. You need to submit your logo on the AB.PR.01 form (found on the Alberta Council website under forms - fundraising). All logos must adhere to the merchandising guidelines that are set up nationally and also available on the Alberta Council Website or on Member Zone.





- Receipts only need to be given if the money received is over \$100.



- A general receipt should be given for any amount of money collected by Girl Guides

of Canada at any level. Official tax receipts for donations can only be issued by the Alberta Council office.



- FR.1s are not required for fundraising for CWFF.



– Raising funds for CWFF and selling Girl Guide cookies are the only

This motion from Alberta Council will affect all members who are hoping to travel. Training will be available by teleconference/Adobe Connect as it is a provincial training and require pre-registration. C.16.10.25 MOTION: Effective January 1, 2017, That all responsible Guiders participating in international and domestic travel requiring a SG.8 participate in a trip planning training before they submit the SG8 and attend a trip financial training within 4 months of receiving the trip binder. If Guiders have previous travel experience as an adult in Girl Guides they will be required to attend a review training. Trips approved prior to Jan 1, 2017 for travel in 2018 onward are required to take both of the trainings within 6 months (June 30, 2017).

JOIN THE TEEN CHALLENGE!

Are you looking for ways to challenge the girls in your unit to become more active? The ParticipACTION Teen Challenge is a good resource for you to bring more activity into your unit activities. A few facts as listed on the ParticipACTION website:

- Only 6% of boys and 2% of girls (15-19 years old) achieve 60 min of moderate to vigorous physical activity (MVPA) per day on at least 6 days per week.
- 73% of 13-17 year olds are watching tv, playing video games and on the computer after school
- Physical activity participation drops with increase age, more drastically among girls than boys. A
 longitudinal study showed that less than 50% of girls continued to participate in team sports in grade 9 as
 compared to grade 7
- Only 23% of teens 13-17 years old actively commute to school and 63% use an inactive mode of transportation. Inactive modes of transportation have increased steadily since 2000
- Between 1986 and 2006, walking for trips to school declined (from 38.6% to 30.7% for 14-15 year olds)
- Get active and you can get better grades increased time in physical activity is associated with better academic achievement
- Adolescents and young adults that regularly practice sport present higher levels of physical self-concept
 (activity, endurance, strength, flexibility, coordination, sport, health, body fat, appearance) than their peers
 who are not involved in sports activities
- Highly-involved athletes are less likely to engage behaviours such as smoking and recreational drug use as compared to non-athletes
- Psychological factors such as self-efficacy, body image and physical self-esteem are significant predictors
 of physical activity among adolescents
- Teenage boys engage in more unstructured physical activity than girls
- Canadian adolescents tend to be less active in the winter months.

PAGES FROM THE PAST

In my last article I told you some of the interesting stories from the Provincial newsletter "Woodsmoke". When the editor of this publication retired in 1964 the office staff took on the task of producing the newsletter and it was given the less than inspiring title of "Newsletter".

However in August 1975 readers were asked to submit ideas for a new name and a design for the front page and the next month "*Tumbleweed*" appeared.

On a personal note – this was its title and it confused me because when I joined Girl Guides of Canada I was a new immigrant and was living in Fort McMurray. As such, I did not see any tumbleweeds. It was not until the following summer when we took a road trip south that I finally seen a tumbleweed. I still remember feeling quite excited at my first sighting.

As we approach the 25th anniversary of the opening of the Alberta Girl Guide House, it is appropriate that I fill you in with some background to this important step. Reading through "*Tumbleweed*" I see that in 1986 Alberta Council members made the decision to purchase their own building.

They had looked at the options of leasing versus purchase and as they had been moving on average every three years, felt that the time and money involved

in this could be better spent on developing Guiding.

Then the fund-raising began. Each month's newsletter reported on the progress of donations, both corporate and individual. Numerous ideas on how to get involved flowed: from province-wide bottle drives termed GHARP (Guiding's Humungous Reclamation Project) to a "Stamping Place" challenge which asked donors to send an outline of their footprint to be preserved in archives. If you took part in the latter you can come and find your footprint. Yes Archives still has them! Fiona Flouse, the Alberta Girl Guide House Mouse, was created to help with public relations and in February 1989 a craft idea of how to make a "Pet Mouse" appeared. The Alberta Government gave some very generous grants and when the building was purchased and renovated it was mortgage free.

How true this rings for all Guiding events! If we go to those meetings dreading them, or because 'we have to' as opposed to 'we want to', how different our evening is! If we attend trainings with an open learning mind, we have much more fun than if we try to speed through the weekend in our cars...Personal mindset is key!

Training that is provided by Girl Guides of Canada (GGC) is designed to enhance the abilities of all adult members, whatever their role in Guiding may be. We have training streams that have been created by our National Office and they are referred to as *TEAM*, which stands for Training Enrichment for Adult Members. These modules have something for everyone.

Unit Guider Stream – If you are a new Guider, or a Guider who is changing Branches, then this stream is for you! These sessions are often offered at Area events and at Multi-Faceted. The sessions included in this stream offer Unit Guiders hints and tips on how to include the girls in planning meetings and events, branch specific information and so much more. The idea sharing that you will enjoy with other Guiders is second to none! Once you complete the foundation modules, TEAM offers a variety of Enrichment modules which will give Unit Guiders more dynamic ideas to take back to their units.

Outdoor Activity Leadership (OAL) – Research has proven that many of our girl members want to camp and be outside. Participating in the foundation OAL stream can assist Unit Guiders in incorporating camp and the outdoors into your program. These sessions are often offered at Area events, Multi-Faceted and HodgePodge and are ideal for anyone who wants to do outdoor activities with their units. Once you have completed the foundation modules, Guiders can move onto the Enrichments sessions which include Tent Camping and Adventure Camping modules.

Commissioner Stream – The Commissioner Stream is designed for Commissioners, Deputies, those interested in being a Commissioner and Advisers. This stream is offered annually in the fall (late Sept/early Oct) as an Alberta Council sponsored Training Event. Three streams are offered during this weekend event - Getting Started is geared towards new Commissioners, or those who are thinking about becoming a Commissioner, More Depth is designed for our 2nd year Commissioner and the Administrator Stream is designed for 3rd year Commissioners and Advisers.

Administrator Stream – As noted above the Administrator Stream is designed for 3rd year Commissioners and Advisers or anyone who is looking for some personal enrichments. These sessions are normally offered at the Commissioners' Workshop which is held annually in the fall, but many of the sessions are also facilitated at Area Training events or Multi-Faceted.

Trainer's Stream – Otherwise known as *Train the Trainer*. The sessions in this stream are geared towards anyone who has an interest in becoming a trainer. They also cover the differences in teaching the adult learner versus the girls. The sessions also cover a myriad of facilitation skills, delivery and design and are facilitated by experienced trainers under Alberta Council. The Trainer Stream is usually offered to Guiders every two years at the Trainers' Workshop which is held in April. Registration for the 2017 Trainer's Workshop being held in Red Deer, April 21-23rd is now open. Check ANY GuideNews and the Alberta Council Website, under Training, for

more information and to register. Please note participating in the Trainer's stream training does not obligate you to become a trainer.


