The Food Sharing Association agreed to arrange the distribution of the baskets to the various local food banks. Prior to distribution, the baskets were weighed at 127.5 lbs. and this amount was entered into the national website for the Eradicating Hunger and Poverty Challenge.

It is noted that the Food Sharing Association is now advertising for children's birthday party supplies and while unconfirmed, we do believe this is the result of our approach back in September. Obviously, a need has existed for this help and we are so proud to have helped with this identification. Rightly so, however, this project idea belongs to Tsawwassen District and for this, needy families on the east coast of our country, thank you. How fabulous it is when ideas from thousands of miles away can find their way to another location and can be shared! This is the network of the Guiding sisterhood!
