As part of the 2024–2026 National Service Project (NSP): Action for Wildlife, more than 1,300 Girl Guides and adult volunteers across Canada have already contributed over 220 hours of community service to protect and restore wildlife habitats. Developed with the Canadian Wildlife Federation, the NSP gives girls hands-on experience in environmental action – from planting pollinator gardens to organizing clean-ups – while building their knowledge of Canada's ecosystems.



Guiding across Canada

Provincial councils bring Guiding to life for girls and youth – organizing events, camps and opportunities for connection from coast to coast to coast. Here’s a snapshot of some of the incredible experiences girls and youth shared in 2024:

Girl Guides in **New Brunswick and PEI**

bonded over book binding, learned about aviation and STEM and hosted a stuffy sleepover.



From Pride to the Stampede Parade, Girl Guides in **Alberta, the Northwest Territories and the Yukon** connected with their communities! They also gathered at a campfire in Edmonton’s Sir Winston Churchill Square and saw over 50 locations light up blue for World Thinking Day.



Pathfinders, Rangers and Guiders hosted games, did face-painting and more at a fun-filled World Thinking Day Carnival at Yarmouth Mall. **Nova Scotia** Girl Guides also designed sleeves for cups at a local coffee shop and did a community service project, spring cleaning at a local cemetery.



Québec members celebrated the new name for Camp Peaceful Waters on beautiful Lac Bouchette in Morin-Heights with four weeks of summer camp fun. 200 Sparks and Embers also enjoyed a Forest Friends day at camp in the spring.



Girl Guide trip units from **British Columbia** travelled across Canada and the globe this year to Mexico, Europe, Japan and more! Over 3,500 members also gathered across the province to wrap up the 2023–2024 Guiding year at Rally Across BC events.



More than 3,900 girls and youth and 1,000 volunteers from across **Ontario and Nunavut** met up in Toronto for GirlJam in May 2024. They exchanged SWAPs, explored STEM, cultivated their creativity in the Arts Pavillion and more.



Girl Guides in **Saskatchewan** embraced STEM with a sci-fi event at the University of Saskatchewan and an engineering challenge. 113 Pathfinders and Rangers and 55 adults from 9 provinces also joined together for Gather 2024, an interprovincial camp.



Guides, Pathfinders, Rangers, Trex and bridging members from across **Newfoundland and Labrador** came together for Camp 4 Elements where the focus was on earth, wind, fire and water with whitewater rafting, glow parties, STEAM activities and more.



The rain didn't stop **Manitoba** Girl Guides from having fun at their province-wide Camp Skills Day and International Cook Off. Members also marched in the Winnipeg Pride Parade, took part in Peyton's Challenge for Earth Day and celebrated World Thinking Day with Folklorama.

Cookies remain the primary fundraiser for Girl Guides of Canada. 

Proceeds from cookie sales support **fun weekly activities, outdoor adventures and travel experiences** for girls and youth across the country. 



Girl Guides sell **5 million** boxes of Girl Guide cookies every year

A total of **100 million** cookies are baked and sold every year in Canada. 

  That's **2.5 cookies** for every Canadian!



For the first time in five years, our cookie box was refreshed with a **modern, fun design** featuring images of **current members**.

Campus Connections

In partnership with the McCall MacBain Foundation, Girl Guides of Canada launched a multi-year Campus Connections pilot program. The program aims to build leadership and team-building skills as well as meaningful experiences through volunteerism while mitigating feelings of social isolation by establishing Girl Guide units on campus.

During the 2023-2024 academic year, the pilot extended its reach from the University of Guelph to three other universities in Ontario and two in Nova Scotia with 129 applicants and 48 students placed in seven units. In 2024 students also attended a Leadership Retreat where they had the chance to apply real-world leadership skills to everyday life through a strengths-based approach.



Fiscal year update

The figures on the following pages represent the combined revenues and expenses of GGC's national office and provincial councils for the period from **January 1 to August 31, 2024**, with the revenues and expenses for the full 2023 calendar year included for comparative information.

The abbreviated eight-month fiscal period reflects a transition of the fiscal year to align with the Guiding year, starting in 2024. Moving forward, the fiscal year will run from **September 1 to August 31** annually.

When comparing the eight-month 2024 information to the calendar 2023 information, it is important to note that the 2024 information includes revenue from one cookie campaign, and the 2023 comparative information includes revenue from two cookie campaigns.
