- ✓ Sparls-2 projects from the following list
- ✓ Brownies-3 projects from the following list
- ✓ Guides 4 projects from the following list
- ✓ Pathfinders and Rangers 4 projects from the following list

Winnipeg Harvest/Food Banks

Check with your food bank to see how you can help. Here are some ideas:

- Volunteer hours at a food bank or soup kitchen
- ❖ Do a community food drive, setup in a mall, school, or a community event
- Ask for food donations all month instead of dues
- ❖ Make a tower of tuna, a castle of KD or a con construction-use your imagination! Take a picture of your activity and send it in to the office. Donate your food directly to the food bank. Project Linus

Project Linus is a 100% volunteer non-profit organization that collects blankets for children undergoing difficult circumstances. Their goal is to comfort severely ill and traumatized children by offering security blankets. Make your blanket a quilt, comforter or receiving blanket. Some ideas for blankets include:

- Crochet-best for older girls and or adult members
- Squares-girls can paint or otherwise decorate individual squares, which are then sewn together. For very young girls, handprints (with or without name and age) would be appropriate
- Fleece-choose one color of fleece for the background and apply cutouts in other colors
- Old pajamas-cut squares of fabric form old, washed pajamas fro a recycled, cozy blanket

Blankets must be handmade and washable. The ideal size is 40"x60". Smaller sizes are also appreciated, but very large blankets should be avoided, as the recipients tend to drag their gifts around with them.

Osborne House

Osborne house mission statement:

Osborne house empowers women and their children who are experiencing domestic abuse by providing them with a safe and supportive environment and through residential and non-residential programs and services.

Osborne house provides a 24-hour, 7 days a week, short-term safe and supportive residential environment for abused women and their children. The staff provides physical needs (food, shelter and clothing) as well as emotional support, factual information, referrals and facilitating support groups to empower women to make informed choices. They also provide short term counseling, support groups and services for abused women requesting assistance in making informed decisions about establishing themselves in a non-abusive environment. While they are residing in the shelter, and after leaving the shelter provides support for the children of abused women, by assisting the children that are affected by family violence to understand the dynamics of abuse in the context of family relationships.
