Program

Gathering: Camp Coloring

Download some camp themed coloring sheets.

Supplies:

Opening Discussion
Talk with the girls about Sparks sleepover or camp. When you go camping, there are some things you need to bring with you, and some things that need to stay at home. At this meeting they will be learning about some of the things they will need at camp. We also talk about the location we are going to and describe the sleeping quarters, type of toilets and lights.
Menu Choices
Talk with the girls about food at camp and what they should expect. This is a great opportunity for Sparks to share their ideas for camp menus.
Supplies: Poster paper Markers Tape Small stickers or dots
Start by asking the girls to recommend some items for meals and snacks, record the most three popular choices on a sheet of poster paper. Label each paper with a category: breakfast, morning snack, lunch, supper, bedtime snack.
Girls will then get up and move around the room, placing a sticker on their favorite item for each category.

Once all the girls have voted have them return to the circle and talk about the top choices. Take this opportunity to brainstorm with the girls what they should do if they

don't like something that is offered, how they can deal with new foods etc.

Camp Clothing Fashion Show

☐ Safety pins

☐ Pencil and paper

Talk about how weather affects the way we dress. Clothing can protect us from cold, sun, rain, snow and wind. Ask Sparks or Guiders for volunteers to be part of a "camp clothes fashion show".

Supplies: Bucket hat or ball cap Sneakers Rain jacket A variety of silly clothes such as fancy dresses, flip flops, etc.			
The leader then points out the different clothing items and asks when it would be good to wear the item, and if it would be good for camp. The Sparks make suggestions about when the clothes would work best. Ask the Sparks if they have questions about what they need for camp.			
Be Prepared Kits	_		
Guiders or older girls attending this event can take this opportunity to talk to the girls about safety at camp. You can talk about things like listening to your Guiders directio to make sure that you stay safe, stay with your groups, always have a buddy, follow instructions when trying something new, watch where you are walking etc.	ns		
Sparks can then break into smaller groups to create a be prepared kit, these kits are excellent to bring in daypacks when camping or hiking or even just for unit meetings.			
Supplies: A waterproof container per girl Permanent marker Duct tape Band aids Whistle			

Putting on Band-Aids

Talk to the Sparks about getting help if they or someone else is hurt. Discuss who is a good person to provide help.

Talk about the proper way to put on a Band-Aid and demonstrate the steps, making sure not to touch the sterile gauze. Have the Sparks practice putting Band-Aids on their own legs or feet.

Bed Rolls

Talk with the girls about what a bed roll is, and why it is important. Walk through each piece of a bed roll and why it is needed. Demonstrate making a bedroll and let them try to carry it.

Optional: make a bedroll hat craft using a piece of felt (bedroll), a piece of foam (sleeping pad) and a small piece of cord or string to tie it together.

Being a Buddy

No one wants to feel left out – and when you are at camp it's even more fun when you have a buddy. If you see someone who needs it, be a buddy!

Ask the girls what makes a good buddy? What would you need a buddy for?

Give each girl a bead, then must then go and find the girl(s) who have the same-colored
beads. They will be buddies and should tell each other something about themselves.
Their buddy will share this with the other girls.
