How Brownies is Turning our Daughters into Young Community Leaders

The 1st Larkhall Brownie Unit of St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador held their annual enrolment ceremony on the evening of November 13th, welcoming 14 new girls and doubling their unit size. This group, located in the heart of the city, represents a diverse mix of seven and eight year old girls who seamlessly interact with one another. It's also apparent by the chatter and uncontrollable giggling that whenever they're together socioeconomics doesn't play a role and their diverse cultural ethnicity is embraced. At this meeting, the only requirement is that you're a friend.



A big part of the Guiding movement is the cookie campaign. This October cookie sales were so successful for this unit it subsidized their fall camping trip by 40 per cent. It also saw first year Brownie, Sarah Maloney receive national recognition as a Cookie All Star for the year 2011 – 2012 in achieving exceptional cookie sales for an individual, selling 29 cases of cookies for her spark unit. Congratulations Sarah!

Daphne Slade is the Unit Brown Owl and the Contact Guider for the 1st Larkhall Brownie group and says that the cookie fundraiser is an important part of the organization. Slade explains that profits from cookies sales benefit their group directly, as it has with the fall camp fee and it also helps the organization function at the National, Provincial, Area and District levels. Slade also recognizes that parents play an important role in this fundraising effort. "Children at this age can't be expected to go door to door selling cookies alone, without parental support and our volunteer Guiders and Unit assistants we would be greatly limited in what we could offer our girls in regards to activities and outings."

This Unit's annual fall camp brought 24 girls and 5 leaders together during one chilly weekend in October. Over these remarkable two days the girls worked on Key badges

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and learned new skills. Group activities that bring the girls together such as camps and field trips are intended to develop leadership qualities, build self esteem and solidify friendships that will hopefully last for years to come.

Only seven weeks into this year's program Slade and her unit Leaders have been diligent in putting together a full itinerary to keep these Brownies busy. "As guiders, it's our mission to nurture these girls and help them to become confident young women who believe that they can make a difference in the world, and you can't do that without exposing them to new experiences." The girls of the 1st Larkhall Brownie Unit regularly keep in touch with a pen pal group from Covington, GA USA called the Daisy Troop, they've celebrated Halloween with a festive costume party, honoured war veterans with the presentation of a Remembrance Day wreath, participated in a sewing project which will benefit Project Little Dresses for Africa and have honoured the Queen by attending a District tea party where the girls all wore specially designed, hand crafted fascinators made specially for them by their Guiders.

This month two women from Newfoundland and Labrador, Sonia Mary Leaman and Juanita Rae Mason each received Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medals for their outstanding contributions to their community and Canada. Slade says these two women represent the embodiment of the guiding movement through their leadership and volunteerism; they are remarkable women that the girls of her unit can look up to. "Community leaders and volunteers are the backbone of our society, as Guiders we try to give back to our community and build on that volunteer base."

District 19 Girl Guides Summer Camp



During August 3-6, 2012 District 19 Girl Guides packed up and headed out to Butterpot for its annual summer camp. This year's theme was an Olympic theme and the girls completed the "Games Go Global" challenge.

To pick a highlight of the camp would depend on which one of us you asked – some will say competing in the Olympic challenge and playing

Wang the Wellie, some would pick campfires and sing-along's, yet some others would say the hike up Butterpot Hill (although we lost a few along the way!), others may respond with the swimming, even some would say sleeping out in tents, some would definitely say the meals (who knew that taco meat and doritios would rank up there

with fine dining) but one activity that caught everyone's attention was geocaching!

What is Geocaching? Geocaching is a real-world, outdoor treasure hunting game using GPS-enabled devices. Guides navigate to a specific set of GPS coordinates and then attempt to find the geocache (container) hidden at that location. More importantly, it's easy and fun to do!

The girls were put in groups of three, handed a GPS and started their first geocache adventure. All it took was

one and we were all



hooked. We did a few in the evening and stopped when it was getting late however we continue to look for other geocache on our hike to Butterpot Hill. Geocaches can be found just about anywhere – we found some hanging from a tree and another hidden in a crack of a giant boulder!

Geocaches vary greatly in size and appearance. You will see everything from large, clear plastic containers to small film canisters to a box wrapped in camouflage tape blending in with its surroundings. Inside the cache usually contains a logsheet for you to log your find. You never know what the cache

owner or visitors to the cache may have left for you to enjoy. Remember, if you take something, leave something of equal or greater value in return.

Camp was a success and all girls (leaders included) had a blast and learned a lot – we all can't wait for next year!

The United Nations declared October 11, 2012 as the world's first International Day of the Girl Child. This international day promotes equal treatment and opportunities for girls around the world in areas such as law, nutrition, health care, education, training, and freedom from violence and abuse. This day was an opportunity to educate others about the importance of girls, to speak against

specific injustices, and to advocate for equality everywhere so girls can pursue their dreams.

On Thursday Oct. 11, 2012 Marconi District in Oceans Edge Area hosted an International Day of the Girl Child event at Morris Academy in Mount Pearl. Helping to celebrate this well attended event were Charlene Johnson, Minister of Child, Youth and Family Services, Lorraine Michael, Leader of the New Democratic Party and Paul Lane MHA for Mount Pearl South. Special guest and Spark in training was Emilia daughter of Robyn Lee, International Adviser, Provincial Council. Girls participated in campfire as well as various activities. Some activities included creating a banner with their handprints and names; WAGGGS postcards in which the girls either drew a picture or wrote a note showing how to get the world they want to live in; and a service project where the girls brought in a non-perishable food item for a local food bank. Girls in the district received a special crest representing the special day. The event coordinators were Marconi District co-deputy commissioners, Tara Skeffington-Boone and Sara Hawkins, and Ashley Skeffington, 1st Mount Pearl Ranger Unit. The District plans on celebrating International Day of the Girl Child again next year.

World Thinking Day 2013

On 22 February 2013, Girl Guides and Girl Scouts worldwide came together to learn about and take action on the themes of "together we can save children's lives" and "every mother's life and health is precious", based on two of the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDG) 4 and 5.

MDG 4 – Reduce child mortality rate by 67% (between 1990 and 2015)

•Progress – Rate has dropped by 41% with some countries reducing their rate by 50%

MDG 5 – Reduce maternal mortality rate by 75% (between 1990 and 2015)

•Progress - Rate has dropped by 47% with some countries already having reached the 75% target

The focus countries for World Thinking Day this year are Republic of Ireland, Jordan, Malawi, Pakistan and Venezuela.



Around the world, 7.6 million children and 287,000 mothers die each year. This situation can, and must, be changed. An activity booklet is posted on the World Thinking Day website for information and activities

to help you raise awareness of the issues of child mortality and maternal health. Together, the 10 million Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in our organization can help ensure that every child and every woman has the best possible chance of living a long and healthy life.

Did you know???

• Of the children under five years of age who died in 2011 more than a third of the deaths were attributable to under nutrition. Two thirds of the children died of infectious diseases, nearly all of which are preventable. Pneumonia, diarrhoea and malaria are leading causes of death among young children.

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- The highest rates of child mortality are found in India, Nigeria, Democratic Republic of Congo, Pakistan and China.
- 99% of maternal deaths occur in developing countries most could be prevented with proven interventions.

There is a need to improve access to voluntary family planning, invest in health workers with mid-wifery skills and ensure access to emergency obstetric care when complications arise.

• One third of all maternal deaths occur in two countries – India and Nigeria. Another third of maternal deaths occur in Democratic Republic of Congo, Pakistan, Sudan, Indonesia, Ethiopia, Republic of Tanzania, Bangladesh and Afghanistan.

Province uses the money to hold trainings for leaders, international trips, Provincial camps and other Provincial events.
