Membership Update 2015-16, by Jo Swinemer, Membership

I'm going to do things a little backwards! In this February Coastlines I'm going to talk about 2015-16 registration, and then next month, I'll go over the 2014-15 numbers. I'll give you a little teaser though: great growth for Nova Scotia Guiding ... girl and adult membership are both up over 6% from 2013-14!

As we did last year, registration for 2015-16 will have a 3 tier roll out:

April 1st – Registration will open for girls returning to their same unit (this includes girls in multibranch units, even if changing branches).

May 4th – Registration will open for all current members registering for a different unit, changing locations, or moving branches. (It was decided that May 4th, not the 1st, would be a better start date, because this is a busy registration period; also, starting on a Monday is better for technical support issues and wait list management.

June 1st – Registration will be open for all girls. New and returning.

Some important things to note:

- Registration begins at 11 am Atlantic for all provinces.
- Ontario Guiding, the largest province, will have their dates shifted a few days to reduce the system load and hopefully avoid site issues on launch days.
- Parents will receive email reminders (or mail, if no email on file) about the dates.
- Leaders should remind parents about registration. Registering early means avoiding disappointment. Girls who can register in April, should!
- Use registration magnets (available soon through your Districts) as reminders.
- Registration fee for 2015-16 will be \$100 for all girls in Nova Scotia.

FEBRUARY IS

February is **Mental Health Awareness Month**, as well as **African Heritage Month**. Following are two articles featuring these very important topics:

Mental Health Awareness, by Kayla Bernard, 1st Halifax Guides

"Mental Illness". Those are two very scary words for most people in our society today. Those are words that we deeply hope are never attached to a girl in our unit, but in reality, we know that this may happen. Even if one of our girls may not be suffering, there may be people in their lives who are. But mental health is a difficult topic... How in the world could we incorporate that into a meeting? How do you make this age appropriate? How do you make sure this does not go over the girls' heads? Luckily, our Guiding sisters in the United States have gotten this started for us.

Girl Scouts of America have partnered with the International Bipolar Foundation to develop a Mental Health Awareness challenge. They have graciously extended it to us as well. The challenge allows the girls to discover how mental illness affects the brain, the stigma and discrimination around mental illness, great achievers who suffer from mental illness, how mental illness is portrayed in the media, and what the girls can do to fight stigma.

You're probably still wondering how you could communicate those messages to a Spark. The great thing about this challenge is that it is an instant meeting with options for every age level. Everything is included, from the background information on the brain (even a neuron hat craft) to bookmarks the girls can give out at school to fight stigma. You can choose from a wide varsity of activities for the age group you are working with, and exclude some categories for younger girls to make it age appropriate for everyone.

The crests, all the requirements and supplemental materials are offered to us for free form the International Bipolar Foundation. Even the shipping is free, so cost is not a boundary for units to bring this to their girls. You can find our more information and order materials by going here:

I find it so rewarding to hear the girls talk about mental health after doing the challenge. For example, when we spoke about bullying and peer pressure, the girls use the word stigma! They used it correctly and talked about how people with mental illness also get bullied. It showed us that the information from the challenge had stuck. It did not go over their heads and they learned from it.




I recommend the Mental Health Awareness challenge to all branches and all units. It opens the door to start conversations about Mental Health early on in life!

African Heritage Month, by Mary-Louise Johnson, Provincial Program Adviser

February is African Heritage Month. Take some time in your unit to honour, commemorate, and celebrate the many contributions people of African Heritage have made to our society.



Visual Arts

- Kente is brightly coloured cloth that often features geometric patterns
- African masks
- Learn about artists of African descent and create a piece of art in a similar style. For example, the beautiful painted story quilts of Faith Ringgold, Kara Walker's silhouettes, the mixed media style of Charmaine Lurch, or the East African Batik of Jane Musoke-Nteyafas
- Discover Egyptican Hieroglyphics and write your name using them!

Dramatic Arts

- Girls can deliver their own "I have a dream" speech after learning about Martin Luther King Junior's speech.
- Learn about women who took action for a better world, such as Viola Desmond, Rosa Parks, Harriet Tubman, or Ruby Bridges. Have girls create and act out a scene that demonstrates how these women lived with courage and strength.
- Learn about writers/poets/spoken word artists such as Chauntay Grant, Maxine Tynes, Lillian Allen, and George Elliot Clarke. Have girls choose and present a poem as a spoken word artist.

Music and Dance

- Find out about African drumming and other musical instruments. Use recycled materials to make your own, such as:
 - Dumbeks (African Drum): http://www.kinderart.com/multic/dumbek.shtml Shekere (African percussion instrument): http://spoonful.com/crafts/shekere
- Explore types of music that were pioneered by African Americans/African Canadians, such as spirituals, Gospel, rap, R&B, Motown. Learn and sing a variety of songs!
- Bring in an expert, or check out youtube (such as this video http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=Ewqq
 -3xJFdI) to learn about African dancing with your unit

Girl Guides at the 2015 First Lego Robotics League

The Nerd Herd was the only Girl Guide sponsored team that was at the First Lego League (FLL) Regional Qualifiers at the NSCC's across the province the week of Nov 24th. They had a great time, and learned a lot!

There are 4 components to an FLL competition: core values, robot design, the project, and the robot game. A team is tested on their comprehension and developed competence in all 4.

Core values tests the team's knowledge of the values that the FLL competitions are built on (team work, gracious professionalism, learning together, having fun, etc.) – something that Girl Guides excel in! The robot design is an opportunity for a team to show how they have adapted their robot to address the challenges, sensors used, and propulsion in the robot game. The project is based on a theme, which is 'World Class Learning' this year. This is another subject in which Girl Guides are very knowledgeable!

This year, the Nerd Herd decided they wanted to teach hearing impaired children how to make a craft, and chose an Olaf craft (from the popular movie "Frozen"). The World Class Learning was in the form of teaching Brownies how to make the craft without any verbal communication (to simulate the inability to hear). The Nerd Herd did an impressive job of this using gestures, powerpoints, movies, and successfully made this adorable craft!







A reminder that units interested in the First Lego League challenges can borrow the NXT Mindstorm robots from the Guide Office (without necessarily having to enter an actual competition). It also fulfills numerous badges in the Guide Program and many challenges in the Pathfinder & Ranger programs.

On January 24th, 2015, members from across Nova Scotia kicked off the Girl Guides of Canada National Service Project "Words in Action". Events were held at libraries around Nova Scotia from North Sydney to Springhill and everywhere in-between. Girls and Guiders collected books from citizens in their communities, conducted readings of Canadian authors, traded books, made crafts and sang "story-songs" to guests.

Many units collected books to be dropped off at their nearest location during the event (including books by the truckload from the Rangers in Musqudoboit Harbour!). Organizations supported by donated books included Maggies Place (Amherst), IWK Childrens Programs, Tantallon Junior High Library, Library Book Sales (in support of new books) and Kentville Food Bank. Overall, approximately 1700 books were brought in, traded and donated!

This project was a great way to work together as a Province to promote literacy and the National Service Project for Girl Guides of Canada.

Did You Know?

Did you know that cookies have insurance? Check out the article below to learn more. Also, did you know you should be following certain guidelines if your girls have pen pals? Read on to find out more.

Cookies in My Basement, by Myrtle Corkum, Risk Compliance

Have you ever wondered what the consequences of storing cookies in your garage or basement – or any other part of your home – would be if an unexpected incident occurred? None of us expects to have a fire in our home or to have a home invasion or have your cookie order destroyed – but such occurrences do – and have – happened!

Prior to the spring of 2014, the responsibility for any such losses of cookies – or cookie revenue – rested squarely on the shoulders of the individual Guider who had them stored in her home. The same was true if the Unit or District's cookie supply was stored in a church hall/basement or other storage facility that was not owned by Girl Guides of Canada. In the case of such a loss, it is not only the cost of the cookies that is lost, i.e. the amount per case your Unit pays for the cookies, but also the loss of potential revenue that would have been received from the sale of those cookies – revenue that you use to provide programming and activities for your girls.

Recognizing the undue responsibility and liability the storage of Cookies placed on our Guiders, in the spring of 2014 Nova Scotia Council approved the transfer of this liability from the individual Guider to the carrier for GGCNS insurance. With such insurance coverage, Guiders can now feel secure that should anything untoward happen, with regards to Cookie storage, that protection is now in place for compensation from our insurance carrier. When that decision was made, little did we know how quickly we would need to use it:

In July of 2014 vandals set fire to St. Andrew's Church Hall on Coburg Road in Halifax. Six Units met at that facility and had storage not only for all of their camping and program supplies but also their cookies! The Church's insurance would not cover any of the Guiding supplies or cookies. Were it not for the previous action taken by Nova Scotia Council to provide insurance on cookies stored on behalf of our Units and Districts, these Six Units would have lost the investment they had made in purchasing the cookies and there would be no additional revenue they'd expected to make from cookie sales.



We wanted to make all Guiders aware of this "Cookie storage protection" as you head into the spring 2015 Cookie Sales. We hope you never have a situation where you will need to access this coverage (if this does occur, please contact your District Commissioner immediately)...All the best for your Cookie Sales!

Note: We are aware of one District that uses a commercial storage facility for cookies, but they have insurance coverage for this. Should any other Unit or District use one also, they must obtain appropriate insurance coverage. Please call the Provincial Office for assistance.



Having a pen pal is a lot of fun, and can also help you meet program requirements and earn badges.

Use these helpful quidelines if your unit has decided to have a pen pal(s):



Before Correspondence Begins:

- Make the initial contact with the pen pal Unit Guider, before involving girl Members.
- Send correspondence from a Guider's mailing/e-mail address, rather than from girls' personal addresses, as a safety precaution.
- Inform parents/guardians of risks and obtain their permission in writing before involving girls in a pen pal exchange.
- Use caution when sharing girls' personal information and/or photographs.

Once You've Made Contact with a Pen Pal Unit:

- Decide on the preferred method of correspondence (e.g., traditional mail, e-mail, moderated blog)
- Have girls think about their goals in the pen pal relationship, and ask about the pen pal's
 goals. Is there a particular type of information you would like to share or are you just
 looking for a new friend?
- Encourage girls to think of fun activities to share with their pen pals. Some ideas:
 - Have both Units work on the same challenge
 - Share camp recipes
 - If both Units have access to Skype, you could have a virtual meeting online
 - Send a file of your Unit singing some favourite songs
