Become a Trainer in 5 easy steps!

Step 1

Complete and submit a TR.3 form that is signed by your Area Commissioner or Training Adviser. You may wish to take Understanding the Adult Learner and/or the Trainer Stream modules before making the decision to submit this form. It needs to be submitted prior to Step 4.

Step 2

Take the Understanding the Adult Learner (UAL) National Module. It is being offered on **January 21st** via Adobe Connect and face-to-face at Guide House on **March 25th** from 1:30-4:30PM. If you have education or experience in this field, you may request equivalency.

Step 3

Take the Trainer Stream. National has a five-module Trainer Stream that includes needs assessment, facilitation skills, training delivery, training design, and training TEAM. We plan to offer the Trainer Stream in April. If you have education or experience in this field, you may request equivalency for some of these modules.

Step 4

Complete a mentorship with a Trainer. You will be paired with a Trainer who will help you to hone your skills as a Trainer Candidate. The length of time spent at this stage varies significantly.

Step 5

Be "viewed." When you are ready, you will be viewed facilitating a session. You will complete a self-observation form and the person observing will give you a feedback form that includes areas of strength and areas for growth.

Mint cookies a success - now don't forget to register for Cookie All Stars!

Girl members work hard to sell cookies, so they should receive recognition for their efforts. The Cookie All Stars program is available at no additional cost and only requires some of your time.

The registration site for 2016-2017 opens in February 2017.

And, there are new rewards this year. Each girl who sells 80+ cases of cookies individually have a choice between:

- Camp Kit (\$300 value) including a backpack with hydration pack, sleeping bag, flashlight, and mess kit
- · Best Buy Gift Card (\$250 value)

If you are using the Cookie Tracker, please note that it is a recording tool that does not automatically register you for Cookie All Stars.

However, Cookie Tracker has a function to transfer sales information directly to the Cookie All Stars site. Guiders are responsible for checking the site to see if their mint sales have been successfully transferred.

Guiders do not have to use the Cookie Tracker tool to register for Cookie All Stars. We recommend that if you have not been using the Cookie Tracker, you register directly on the Cookie All Stars site.

If you have cookies from Trex, a Trip Unit, Lones, Transitioning Members, or other individual cases, you can now record the cases on the Cookie All website.

Instructions for recording these cases will be posted on Memberzone in the Cookie All Stars section before the registration site opens.

If cookies were sold at a group event, they cannot be added to girls' individual sales.

Did you know that 54% of units who took part in fall Cookie All Stars weekend sold 6 to 15 cases?

Any units who took part will be receiving their crests shortly, if they haven't already.

The power of "fancy" badge presentations

A year later, we've done paper bags, gingerbread people, Valentines, trefoils, clipboards, and more.

It takes a little more time, but the girls' reactions are worth it. And now, it's simply tradition!

How to borrow historical uniforms for Thinking Day

Included is a uniform very much like the one that Lady Baden Powell is wearing in the photo above - even the hat! In the photo she is with a group of Nova Scotia Girl Guides that attended the 1948 World Conference in New York.

At past Thinking Days, the loaned uniforms have been used for static displays, fashion shows, re-enactments of the Crystal Palace Rally, special appearances by Lady Baden-Powell, and many more creative activities.

Due to the volume of requests, interested units are encouraged to submit theirs early. There is a maximum of five uniforms per loan.

There is no fee, but the cost of shipping is the responsibility of the requesting unit. There is also a damage deposit of \$25 that is returned if the uniforms are returned in good order and on time.

- Loans to be shipped: February 8
- Local requests: February 15

Mid-year registrations

Did you know that Nova Scotia has six areas, 32 districts, more than 340 units, and nearly 6000 members?

National census is on January 31st. Let's beat last year's numbers: 4724 girls and 1151 adults.

It's never too late to join Guiding, if a unit has space.

For more than 50% of interested members at this time of year, there aren't available spaces. Please think about whether your units can accommodate more girls and have your DC contact me about unit capacities.

Membership fees are not prorated, but new members are not expected to pay dues or activity fees for time passed, so they do not have to pay the full amount. Financial assistance is always available.

And what about those just-turned-five girls? They are welcome to join when they turn five, even if they aren't in school.

Girls are encouraged to remain with their peer group, so these girls end up doing 2.5 years of Sparks.
