

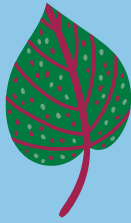

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Land Acknowledgement



Land acknowledgements recognize the traditional territories of Indigenous Peoples, both recorded and unrecorded. We honour the Indigenous Peoples, past and present, who have lived on, worked on, and cared for this land for generations. We thank all peoples for cherishing and maintaining the connections and importance of the land.

Learning about the history of the land where you live and Guide is an important step. Please take the time to complete a land acknowledgement at the beginning of your camp. The land you acknowledge will depend on where your event is taking place.

To find out who to acknowledge, you can try the following options:

1. Download Whose Land – A web-based app that uses GIS technology to assist users in learning about the territory your event is situated on.
2. Contact a local Friendship Centre.
3. Create your own land acknowledgment.

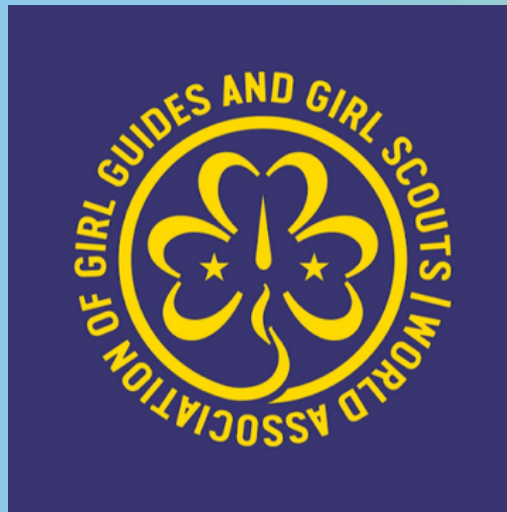
Introduction

WAGGGS:



For over 100 years, more than 250 million Girl Guides and Girl Scouts have made a difference through leadership, community service and advocacy. The Movement began in 1909 when girls in the UK declared themselves Girl Scouts, inspiring Lord Robert Baden-Powell to create a program specifically for girls. His sister, Agnes Baden-Powell, officially established the Girl Guide Association in 1910, and the Movement quickly spread worldwide.

In 1920, the first World Conference brought leaders together to share ideas, strengthening international connections. As global cooperation grew, representatives proposed forming a unified organization. In 1928, delegates from 26 countries founded the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) to connect and support national organizations. Today, WAGGGS unites Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in 150 countries, continuing the legacy of global friendship and empowerment.



World Centres

The idea of creating World Centres grew out of the international spirit that flourished after the first World Conference of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in 1920. The World Centres are intended to create places where members from around the world can come together to share ideas, learn from one another and experience the global sisterhood of Guiding.

- Our Chalet (Switzerland) – Opened in 1932, it was the first World Centre to be created. Our Chalet is located at 1,350m altitude in the Bernese Oberland. Close to the village of Adelboden it features views of the mountains and access to a number of outdoor attractions and activities. It is designed as a place for adventure, leadership and international friendship in the Swiss Alps. [Learn more about Our Chalet!](#)
- Our Cabaña (Mexico) – Opened in 1957, Nuestra Cabaña, also known as Our Cabaña is a place to make international friends while learning useful skills and gaining new experiences. Since opening, Our Cabaña has received more than 70,000 Girl Guides and Girl Scouts from all over the world. [Learn more about Our Cabaña!](#)
- Sangam (India) – Opened in 1966 in Pune, India; Sangam, meaning ‘Coming Together’ in Sanskrit, was founded with the intent to unite Girl Guides and Girl Scouts from around the world. [Learn more about Sangam!](#)
- Pax Lodge (United Kingdom) – By the 1930s, more than one million girls and women had joined the Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting Movement. As the number of international visitors to London grew, it became clear that Guides and Scouts needed a place to stay. In 1937, the World Board agreed to establish a new World Centre next to the World Bureau. The first of these centres, Our Ark, opened in 1939. As WAGGGS continued to expand, Olave House, named in honour of Olave Baden-Powell, opened in 1959. By 1978, plans were made to connect Olave House and the World Bureau, leading to the purchase of new land and the creation of a modern, unified centre. Pax Lodge officially opened in 1991. Its name pays tribute to the Baden-Powells, their homes in England and Kenya both carried the word pax, the Latin term for peace. The name symbolizes the central role of peace within the Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting Movement. [Learn more about Pax Lodge!](#)



- Kusafiri (Africa Region) – Established in 2011 as a “mobile” World Centre, Kusafiri moves around different countries in Africa, bringing the World Centre experience to Girl Guides and Girl Scouts across the continent. At the World Conference held in Cyprus in 2023 it was decided that Kusafiri would be located in Ghana until 2026, upon which time it would relocate within the African Region. Kusafiri provides an opportunity to immerse in the culture of the Africa Region, learn about oneself and build connections. [Learn more about Kusafiri!](#)

Together, the five World Centres embody the spirit of the Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting Movement, creating lifelong memories, inspiring leadership and building a better world through friendship and shared purpose.



World Thinking Day 2026

Taking place on February 22nd, World Thinking Day provides an opportunity to celebrate the Guiding and Scouting Movement, advocate for issues affecting women and support 11.2 million members among 153 countries. In 2026, the theme, Our Friendship, which marks 100 years of World Thinking Day, encourages curiosity, creativity and meaningful connections within the global Guiding and Scouting community.



History of World Thinking Day

In 1926, delegates at the 4th World Conference agreed that February 22nd would be known as a special day for Girl Guides and Girl Scouts all over the world.

A special day:

In 1926, Girl Guide and Girl Scout delegates from around the globe met in the USA for the 4th World Conference. Among other decisions, they agreed that there should be a special annual day when Girl Guides and Girl Scouts around the world think of each other and express their thanks and appreciation for their international Movement. This was called Thinking Day. The delegates chose February 22nd as the date for Thinking Day because it was the birthday of both Lord Baden-Powell, founder of the Boy Scout Movement, and Olave Baden-Powell, who was World Chief Guide.

A birthday gift:

Six years later in 1932, the 7th World Conference was taking place in Bucze, Poland, when a Belgian delegate pointed out that a birthday usually involves gifts, and thought girls could show their appreciation on Thinking Day by offering gifts to the international Movement through fundraising or making a donation.

Olave Baden-Powell wrote a letter to all Girl Guides and Girl Scouts later that year to tell them about this idea and to ask them to spare a penny to help support Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting around the world.

Prepare for World Thinking Day 2026 - Sample Schedules

The following is a suggested schedule for a unit meeting. Guiders are encouraged to adapt it to best suit the needs and interests of their unit. Units may choose to celebrate World Thinking Day in various ways, from a camp or sleepover to a single meeting. Review each activity and decide which ones you'd like to include. Keep in mind that some activities may require more time or preparation than others.

Want to add to the fun? Invite another unit to bridge with you and complete activities together! This could be a unit of the same branch, or one that is older or younger. Inviting another unit to join is a great way for youth to make new friendships and Guiders to divide the work required for planning and leading the meeting.

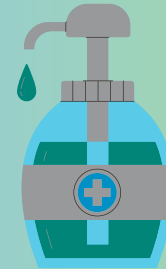
Suggested kit lists

Group equipment for Day Camp

- Camp paperwork (Health forms, SG forms, itinerary, etc.)
- First Aid Kit
- Cooking equipment (if you are cooking)
- Camping stove
- Fuel
- Pots and or pans
- Cooking cutlery
- Individual cutlery (is the group providing or are youth asked to bring their own mess kits?)
- Garbage bags
- Dishwashing and kitchen clean-up supplies (Are you doing dishes there? Packing up and taking dirty dishes home to wash?)
- Hand sanitizer
- Cleaning wipes



Individual kit list (Youth and Adult)

Before camp, consider having a pre-camp meeting and discussing what items the youth should bring and why they're important. You can also discuss what items should not come to camp.

- Water bottle
- Weather appropriate clothing
- Hat and sunscreen
- Bug spray
- Small backpack



World Thinking Day event

Arrival

Leaders

- Schedule a time for parents to drop off youth.
- Conduct a safety check of the building/area.
- Locate fire escapes and identify an emergency meeting spot.
- Unpack and set up equipment and supplies.
- Review safety plans with other Guiders.
- Review the roles and responsibilities of each Guider.

Youth

- Arrive at the designated time.
- Sign in with Leaders.
- Hand in any required forms or medication.
- Begin opening activities while others arrive.
- Participate in a safety debrief with the group.



Expectations

- Use the buddy system to ensure everyone has a partner.
- Establish clear boundaries for unit activities.
- Identify a specific location where the unit will gather in case of an emergency.
- Identify and communicate who the First Aid Guiders are.
- Use hand sanitizer or wash hands before and after eating.
- Drink plenty of water throughout the day to stay hydrated.
- If outside, dress for the weather!
- Have fun!



Activities

This resource package includes a variety of activities that Guiders can use to engage their youth members. Units are encouraged to select the activities that best suit their group and spark the most interest. Activities can be adapted or adjusted to meet the specific needs of the unit. Keep in mind that some activities may require more time or preparation than others. 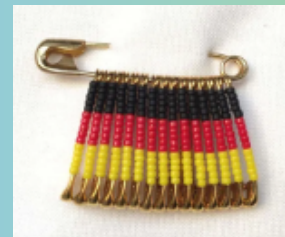
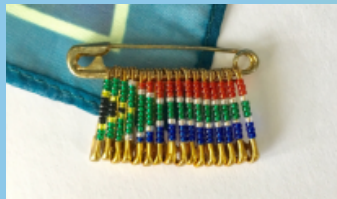

Mom was very impressed with Sarah's knowledge of the country in the eastern part of the WORLD.

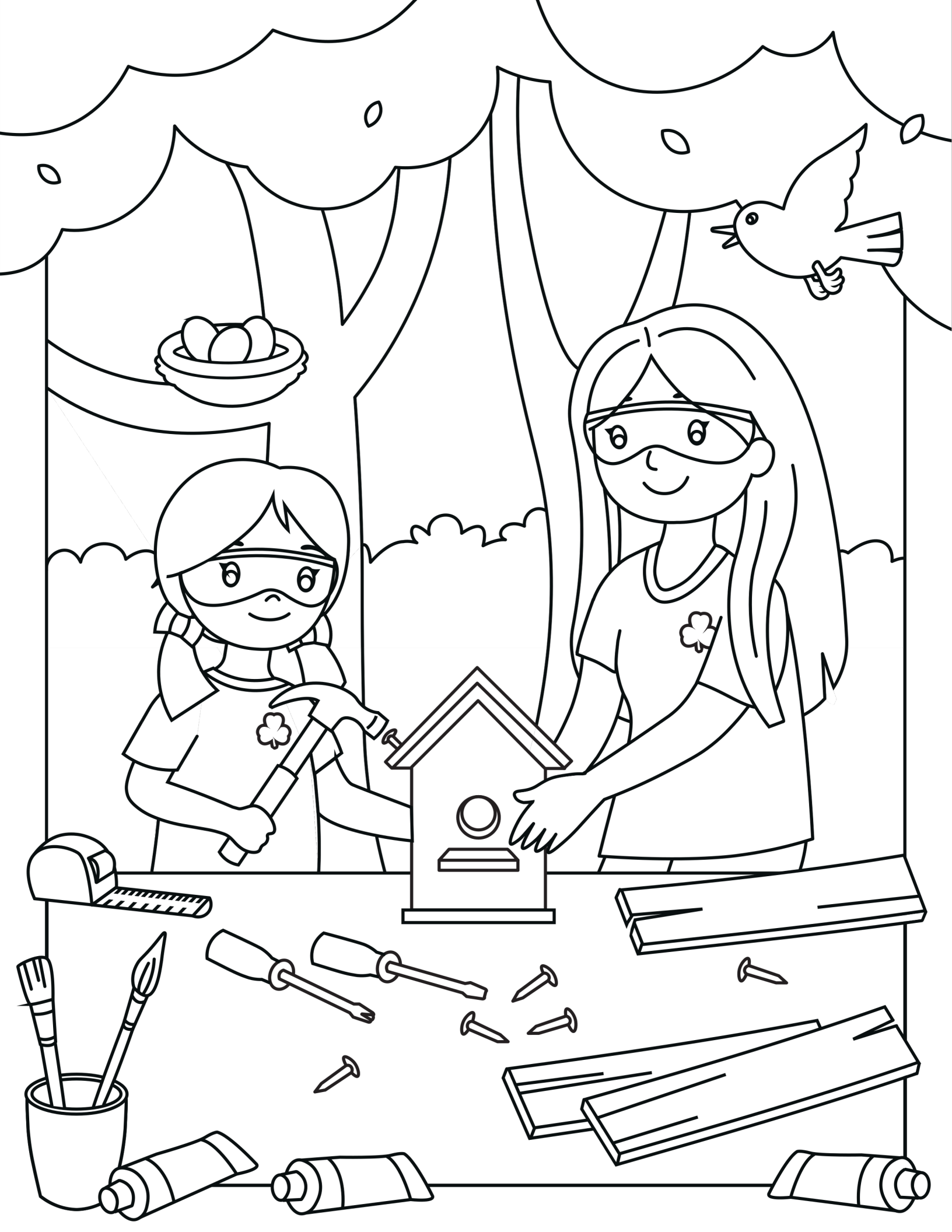

Sarah thought OUR CABANA sounded wonderful! She especially liked that they provided games, treats and fiesta with a real piñata for visitors and children from the area.

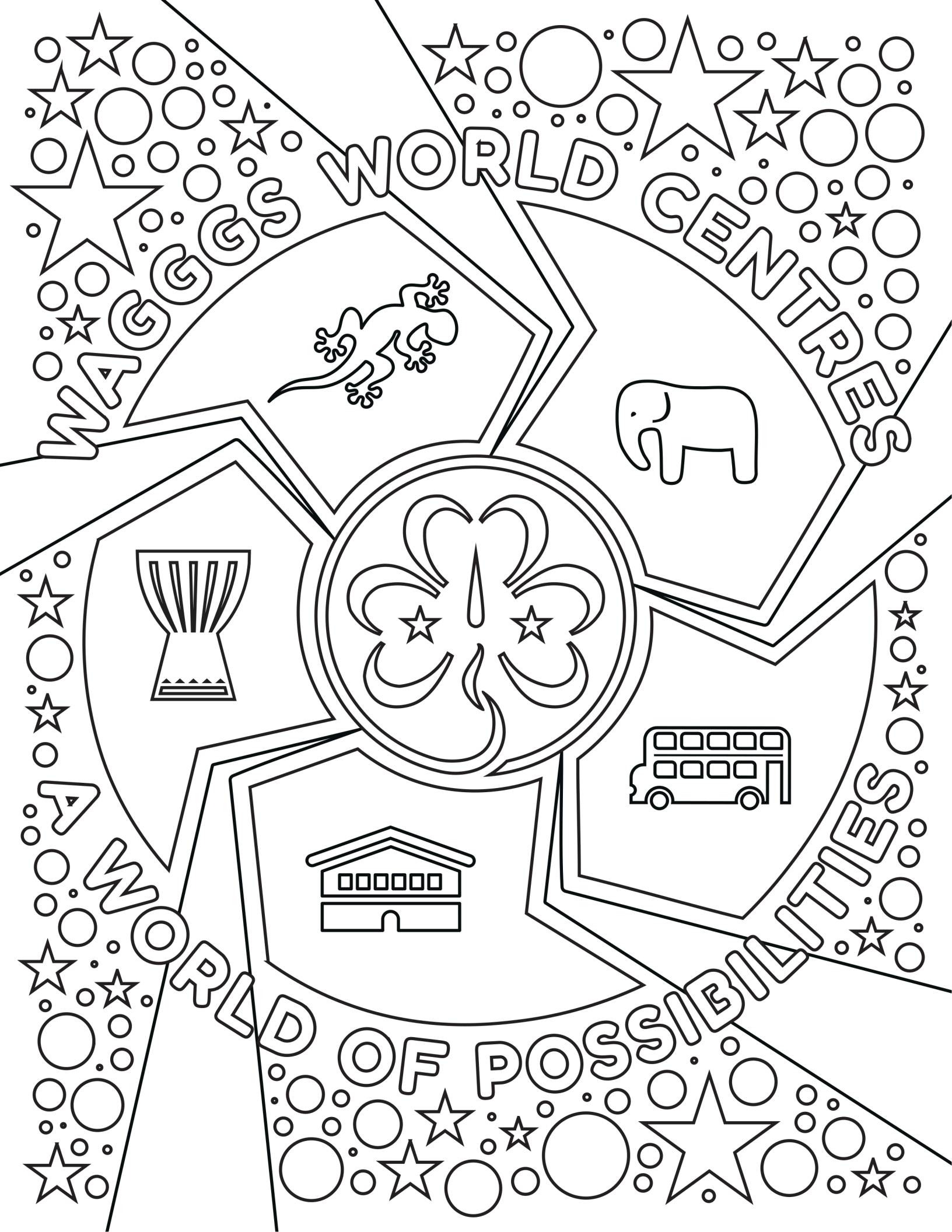
"In another part of the world is PAX LODGE in England. Pax is another word for peace. All of my SISTERS in Guiding can stay at PAX LODGE if they ever visit England!" Sarah continues, "I have another SISTER that takes visitors skiing when they visit OUR CHALET in Switzerland. OUR CHALET visitors present songs and stories about their own countries so their Guiding SISTERS can learn about all of the countries around the WORLD. OUR CHALET was the very first WORLD Centre.

"Each WORLD Centre has its own song and is special in its own way. But each WORLD Centre is the same too. It's for all Guiding SISTERS and offers fun and friendship from all around the WORLD!" Sarah's mom smiled. She was glad that Sarah had found her SISTERS in Guiding; she didn't have extra bedrooms if there were her SISTERS at home.
