Awards for Guides



Lady Baden-Powell Award

(check National website for updates)

This award provides girls with the opportunity to learn more about Girl Guides and gain a deeper understanding of the sisterhood of Guiding. The Lady Baden-Powell award is the highest award girls can earn in the Guides program.

Due to the addition of a new Program Area in the 2019-2020 Guiding year, Guides will use two sets of Lady Baden-Powell requirements for this Guiding year in order to ensure that 3rd year Guides are not disadvantaged by this change. For the 2019-2020 Guiding year **only:**

Awards for Pathfinders



Community Service Award (PDF)

The Community Service Award is an opportunity for girls to find out what's going on in their community and learn how they can make a difference in the lives of others.



Citizenship Certificate (PDF)

Earning the Citizenship Certificate demonstrates that Pathfinders actively care about Canada and the people around them.



Canada Cord

The Canada Cord encourages girls to meet new people, learn more about themselves and their abilities, and puts their leadership skills into action. It is the highest award a Pathfinder can achieve.

Awards for Rangers



Ranger Service Project (PDF)

The Ranger Service Project is designed to help girls use their skills, creativity, and feelings to make a positive contribution to their community.



Cookie Campaign Challenge (PDF)

This challenge is designed to support girls in developing skills in event planning, money management, communications, public speaking and customer service.



Trailblazer Leadership Award (Bronze, Silver, Gold) (formerly the Chief Commissioner Award) (check the National Website for updates)

This prestigious award is the culmination of a Ranger's work as a girl Member. The award recognizes a girl's outstanding achievement and her commitment to the Vision, Mission and Values of Girl Guides of Canada. The Trailblazer Leadership Award is the highest award a Ranger can earn.

- She is well respected by her peers, Guiders and other Members of the community.
- She must be a camper at the Ranger level.

Provincial Commissioner's Honours Youth Award

The Provincial Honours Youth Award is given to recognize a Youth Member aged 12 to 18 registered in Pathfinders, Trex or Rangers who volunteers for Provincial events. Months of eligibility: May to May. The award is presented at the Girl Recognition Event or the AGM.

Blue – "In the Spirit"



- Actively participate in the planning of a Provincial event(s) (May to May)
- Show initiate and commitment to the provincial committee to which she participates
- Attend all meetings or submit a report
- Participate on the day of the event
- Actively belong to a unit

Gold – "You Rocked It"

- Actively lead or co-lead in the planning of a Provincial event(s) (May to May)

- Attend the day of the event

Change Maker Award



Guiding encourages each girl to be everything she wants to be. From Sparks to Rangers, girls in Guiding do amazing things to make the world better. Through community service, friendship, advocacy and so much more, girls are a collective force of change makers!

Girl Guides of Canada's Change Maker Award celebrates girls' confidence, resiliency, independence, open-mindedness and fulfillment as defined by herself. The award recognizes girls across all branches as they take actions, small or large, local or international, community based or far-reaching.

This year's recipients demonstrate remarkable examples of selflessness, generosity and courage. Advocates for equality, the environment or their classmates, they're true role-models for their community.

Self-nominated or nominated by a friend, each of the 20 girls will receive an award pin and a certificate. Their stories will also be featured nationally throughout the Guiding community. All girls who were nominated will receive a letter of recognition from the Chair of the Board of Directors.

Change Maker Award

Letter of Commendation

A Letter of Commendation may be given to a girl or adult Member in recognition of service to GGC. There is no specific criteria other than that the person must have displayed service deserving of recognition. It may be given to/from any Member or Friend of Guiding.

Scholarships

Provincial Scholarships



This year alone (2021), we are offering **2** - **\$500** scholarships entitled **"Québec for Empowerment"** for youth only and the Hay Foundation is offering **2** - **\$1000** scholarships for youth or adults. These scholarship are conditional on acceptance to a full-time post-secondary program at an institution of the applicant's choice. The \$500 or \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded to the recipients as soon as GGC-Québec Council has received proof that the recipients are, in fact, full-time students attending the institutions indicated on their applications.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

If you are between the ages of 14 and 25 and you enjoy a personal challenge, you can work towards the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. This award is not a Guiding award, however, many girls in Guiding do set out to achieve this award. There are three achievement levels: Bronze, Silver and Gold. You can design your own challenge (which will be credited to you in Guiding) by setting goals in four areas: Service, Adventurous Journeys, Skills, and Physical Recreation. NATIONAL AWARDS



Membership Pin

All girl and adult Members receive a Membership pin indicating the number of years of GGC Membership. Only one Membership pin is worn at a time. Pins are provided by <u>the District</u> at the beginning of each Guiding year. After 15 years, Membership pins are awarded at five year intervals. Pins for years 20 and up (5 year increments) are presented at the AGM by Provincial Council.



Gold Thanks Pin

The Gold Thanks Pin may be given to a girl or adult Member who has contributed in any capacity that deserves thanks. There is no specific criteria other than that a Member must have displayed service deserving of thanks. The pin is often given for one specific action, but can also be given for overall good service. Nominators must provide a completed R.3 form, along with a letter describing the nominee's service to Guiding. This award may be given at any level with the permission of the council concerned. The Gold Thanks Pin may be awarded more than once to the same Member, but consideration should be given to the presentation of a different award.



Fortitude Award

The Fortitude award is granted by the Board of Directors to girl or adult Members who have shown great courage and endurance in adversity. The application comes from the province to the Board. The Award may be given posthumously in special circumstances. Fortitude must have been demonstrated within the past 12 months; however, the onset of adversity may have occurred further in the past. Posthumous applications must be made no more than one year after death.



Valour Award

The Valour award is granted by the Board of Directors to a girl or adult Member who has shown heroism in risking her life to save or attempting to save the life of another person. The Valour award has three levels:

- Bronze for high risk to personal safety
- Silver for considerable risk to life
- Gold for greatest heroism and risk to life (highest award)

Applications must be made as soon as possible and no more than 12 months after the incident. The application comes from the Province to the Board of Directors. Nominators must provide a completed R.3 form, along with two letters of support. This award is granted by the Board of Directors. The cost of the pin is to the nominator i.e. approximately \$115.
