


Trefoil Trails Girl Guide Camp
Pike Lake Provincial Park



Trefoil Trails is located approximately 35 km south of Saskatoon within the boundaries of Pike Lake Provincial Park. To get to Pike Lake Provincial Park take Highway #7 and turn left onto Highway #60 and follow to Park entrance **OR** take Valley Road south out of the city (past the City Landfill) and turn left on to Highway #60 and follow to Park entrance.

During the summer months when the Provincial Park is open all visitors must sign in at the park gate. Indicate that you are heading to Girl Guide camp and they will let you through the gates. During the off season months the gate is open.

Pass through the gate and take the immediate left into the park. The road curves to the left. Continue on this road. You will pass the golf course on the left and then some cabins on both sides. You will come to the tennis court on your left and boat launch/beach area on your right. Immediately after the tennis courts turn left.

There is a small dirt road straight ahead – continue up this road until you pass through the gates of Trefoil Trails. If you make a loop around the tennis courts you have missed the road. *(Families are asked to park at the tennis courts and walk with their girls up the road).*

What does Trefoil Trails have to offer you?

Baden Powell Lodge:



A spacious lounge at the front of the lodge includes a fireplace, perfect for campfires on those cold winter nights.

Located on the main site, this is the perfect setting for residential camping and a great space to use in any season! The main lodge has a spacious kitchen and eating area with running water from May to September. It is equipped with two electric stoves and a fridge, freezer, dryer and microwave. A smaller kitchen off the main lodge also has an eating area with a fridge, stove and running water. Both kitchens are stocked with cooking equipment.

Two fire pits are located in the forest and provide girls a chance to meet the Pixies and Gnomes that reside at Trefoil Trails.

Pixie Glen:



Three cabins, which each sleep eight, are open from early May until September. The cabins are not heated and do not have mattresses, but they are a great introduction to camping for younger or less experienced campers.

Nyeri:

This site has a spacious field area to accommodate your tents. A large campfire pit, with benches, is in the center of the field.



A covered shelter with picnic tables provides space for meals and crafts. The electrified pantry area contains a fridge and outdoor

cooking equipment.

A large outdoor wood burning barrel is used for cooking. The site also has its own water tap and



flagpole. Other buildings on the site include a

storage garage, wood shed and latrines.



New in 2017 was the 100 Year Legacy Gazebo between the cook shelter and tent area!

This site comfortably accommodates 30 campers.

Pathways:

This 'wilderness' campsite is perfect for more adventurous girls. A covered, electrified, shelter with picnic tables is used for food preparation and eating.

Small and large cooking areas provide opportunity for cooking in patrols or as a unit. This site also has the newest outhouse at camp, a campfire pit, a water tap, a flagpole and access to a fridge in the Nyeri garage.



Other Features:



Trefoil also has a number of smaller, self-contained sites. These are designed for small groups and would be ideal for a Pathfinder 3rd Camp (was Gold Camp).

The camp is honeycombed with trails that take advantage of the hilly terrain with its cool aspen groves and dry meadow. It is not unusual to be able to follow the path of a white tailed deer or a jack rabbit through the woods.

A beach outside the camp boundaries provides a place for pond dipping and canoeing. The pool, located within the Provincial Park, offers a great place to cool off during hot summer days.

The "Guides Own" circle located near the camp's northern boundary can be used for ceremonies.

All campers have year round access to wiener roasting sticks and bush pie makers. In the winter, groups can rent snowshoes from the Area office to bring to camp.

Within the Provincial Park there is a nature trail that provides a stimulating look at the diverse eco-systems that exist on our Saskatchewan Prairie. Other opportunities for learning may be available, contact the park for more information!
