## Hurray! Summer is coming!

Along with warmer weather, the camping season will soon be here! We, in Saskatchewan, are very fortunate to have two excellent provincial campsites owned by Provincial Council. Each camp has its own unique flavour and each is managed by a hard working and dedicated volunteer operating committee that oversees the campsites.

**Can-ta-ka-ye**, on the shores of Diefenbaker Lake near Birsay, has a large lodge with a kitchen, a large eating/activity room, and upstairs sleeping rooms. There is also lots of space for outdoor games, tenting, outdoor cooking and campfires, plus a beach for water activities. Units can make bookings through the Provincial Office for the spring camps or independent camping. Girls can register individually for the programmed summer camps.

**Heritage Camp**, on the shores of Heritage Lake north of Prince Albert, is not as large as Can-ta-ka-ye, but it has a sleeping lodge, a kitchen/activities building, and space for tenting and outdoor activities. Nestled in the trees and with a beautiful sandy beach, Heritage is a great place for outdoor activities. Units can make bookings through the Provincial Office.

So, whether you take advantage of either of our two provincial campsites or not, hopefully you will give your girls an opportunity to camp somewhere this year. ## LONE STAR DISTRICT!



Lone Star District in Saskatoon is unique in that it is comprised of four Units running in several of the core neighbourhoods of the city. Girls being girls enjoy the fun and challenges the program provides; however, a financial barrier exists for their families and limits the types of activities available to them. The District is fortunate to have been the recipient of National's Energizer Grant that has allowed them to participate in activities they may not otherwise have had the chance to experience.

The District has been focusing on literacy and partnered with READ Saskatoon and Frontier College to hold a "Reading Olympics" event that provided lots of fun with literacy focused activities in a round robin. They ended the day with a pizza supper and draws for free books provided by Frontier College.



A second event was a district sleepover held at Wanuskewin Heritage Park. This event focused on activities that highlighted Aboriginal culture. They made pottery, learned about hunting bison, played traditional games and baked bannock on an open fire to name a few of the activities.

The District is fortunate to have been supported financially not only externally but through Guiding's Membership Financial Assistance programs at both Provincial and Area levels. Girls who are potentially at risk can have the positive experiences to enrich their lives through Girl Guides.



## SPOTLIGHT ON MEMBERS – Unit Guiders!

**Jess Glasman** is a Guider for the 17<sup>th</sup> Guiding Unit in the Northern Stars District.

**What opportunities have you had in Guiding?** I have had the opportunity to grow as a leader over the last six years through trainings such as January conferences as well as through collaborating with other leaders. What I look forward to the most as a Guider is traveling with the girls and giving them bigger and better opportunities every year to expand their experiences and knowledge through programming. My biggest opportunity this year will be taking a group of Guide and Pathfinder aged girls to SOAR in BC this July.

**Why have you stayed in Guiding? How did you get involved?** I have been involved in Guiding for 13 years. I started in Brownies and went through to Pathfinders. After Pathfinders I became very busy with other activities in school and unfortunately had to leave Guiding. I remembered my days of Guiding fondly: great adventures camping, badge work and going out into the community. I became a leader six years ago and I haven't looked back since! My main goal from day one has been to bring interesting, fun and creative ways to help the girls earn program and badge work. Giving girls the opportunities to camp, go on field trips as well as meet special guests right at their own meetings has been a fun way for the girls to experience and to learn. I've stayed in Guiding because of the fun of working and collaborating with other leaders who have become close friends of mine. I've also stayed in Guiding for the excitement of the girls that I work with. There are no words to express a Guide beaming bright after experiencing horseback riding for the first time, from seeing a new baby calf follow a Pathfinder around the corral, or from a first time camper building her first campfire. The girls' excitement for learning is what brings me back each week and watching them grow up to become successful and confident brings me back every year.

## What registration numbers can tell us

**April 1, 2013:** Online Registration opens for **2013-2014** year.

**April 5, 2013:** Registration is open for girls returning to the same Unit.

*Total number of girls registered: 14*

**April 26, 2013:** Priority registration for girls returning to the same Unit is coming to an end.

*Total number of girls registered: 95*

**May 3, 2013:** Registration is open for returning girls who are switching branches.

*Total number of girls registered: 151*

**May 24, 2013:** Priority registration for girls returning to Guiding is coming to an end.

*Total number of girls registered: 261*

**June 14, 2013:** Registration has been open for all for two weeks.

*Total number of girls registered: 442*

**August 9, 2013:** Summer vacation is half over.

*Total number of girls registered: 609*

**September 13, 2013:** School has been in session for a week.

*Total number of girls registered: 1180*

**September 20, 2013:** Unit meetings are starting up for the year.

*Total number of girls registered: 1364*

**October 11, 2013:** Many Units in the province are up and running. Guiders and commissioners are working hard to find new Guiders and develop great programming.

*Total number of girls registered: 1898*

**November 1, 2013:** Almost all Units are going. Girls are having a great time, Guiders are hitting their stride.

**November 15, 2013:** Regular Unit meetings, camps and sleepovers are happening around the province.

**March 7, 2014:** Registration for 2013-2014 Guiding year is winding down. IMIS is about to shut down in preparation for registration for 2014-2015 Guiding year. *Total number of girls registered: 2509*

Comparing the 2013-2014 numbers to the year before, it is easy to see that online registration and on-time registration are increasing. Way to go Saskatchewan Guiders! All together we can make sure we all count. This year 18 girls were missed in the official count. This is a tremendous improvement from the year before when 37 girls didn't count. How low can we go in 2014-2015? Together we can make sure that everyone Guiding in Saskatchewan counts!

# New streamlined process for updating your PRC

GGC has now partnered with BackCheck Services to facilitate police records checks (PRCs).



What this means for **current members**:

- PRC renewal will be ordered online.
- Your PRC process will be completed quickly and easily from your computer.
- GGC will pay for all PRCs – new ones and renewals.



When it is time to renew your police record check, the Provincial Office will send you an email containing a link to the BackCheck Girl Guide page. To set up your account, select your role (current member), your location (Saskatchewan Council) and then enter your iMIS number. As a confirmation, you will be emailed a link from BackCheck that will allow you to complete your PRC renewal. Saskatchewan Council is working on the fine details of implementing this process; more information will be provided as we move forward.

**New Members** will be required to use BackCheck Services to complete their PRC as well as personal reference checks.

**Non Members** will be required to pay for their PRC using BackCheck.

## Online Registration

**Registration for the 2014 - 2015 season is now open!** Fee remains the same at **\$125**.

Please note:

- Encourage re-registration and promote the online registration process.
- There is a three tiered re-registration structure again this season:
  - April – girls returning to same Unit
  - May – girls returning to Guiding and registering in any Unit
  - June – open registration (returning or new girls)
- Save \$10 by registering before 11 a.m. on June 27, 2014.
- Family plan rates continue to be in effect throughout the year.
- A membership subsidy is available if required.
- If you have any questions, please contact your Area Office.

Please continue to promote and support this process!

## Year End Details

As we near the end of another Guiding year, remember to do the following:

- Present all badges that the girls have earned.
- Celebrate the girls' advancement with a ceremony and invite the parents.
- Promote the summer camping opportunities at Can-ta-ka-ye to your girls.
- Thank the people who supported your Unit this Guiding year.
- Have a year-end party or wind up event.
- Go camping with your Unit. Try Can-ta-ka-ye or Heritage!
- Ensure your Unit books are in order – bills are paid, money has been deposited and spreadsheets and reports are completed and given to your commissioner.
- Return the keys for your meeting place, if so required.
- Send all information about your Unit (start up date and returning Guiders) for next fall to your district commissioner and the Area Office.
- Relax and rejuvenate over the summer months in preparation for another busy year of Guiding.
- Know that your efforts are worthy and appreciated!

This fund is to promote camping in tents and is available to assist a group or individual participating in tent camping.

## Saskatchewan Provincial Council Scholarships

Members may apply for both the **Mildred Baldwin Scholarship** and the **Cynthia O'Connor Scholarship** in the same year but can only receive one per year. If they receive one the first year they may apply for the other scholarship the next year, but may only receive each scholarship once.



### Criteria for both scholarships:

- Individuals must be a current Girl Guides of Canada member.
- Unsuccessful applicants may apply again.
- Priority will be given to applicants with a strong background in Guiding and community involvement.
- The selection committee uses a marking scale that reflects the level of activity a girl/woman has with regard to service, camping, etc., and is also looking for creativity in the "What Guiding Means to Me" statement. The committee looks forward to reviewing the applications each year and is always impressed with the involvement of the applicants in their community.

**Deadline** for applications, including references and handwritten letter, is **September 1**. Application forms are available on the provincial website or from the Provincial Office. Please send references in sealed envelopes with your application. Application and documents are to be sent by mail, fax or email to the Provincial Office.

### Documents required to process application: *Please make sure to send in all the documents!*

- Completed application form – available from the Provincial Office or on the Saskatchewan GGC website
- Proof of enrolment at a post secondary institution
- Letter of reference (Inside Guiding) – in sealed envelope
- Letter of reference (Outside Guiding) – in sealed envelope
- Handwritten letter "What Guiding Means to Me" (maximum 200 words) (Black ink is more professional!)

### **Mildred Baldwin Scholarship**

One scholarship of \$500 awarded annually

#### Criteria:

- Has been an active member of Girl Guides for at least five years.
- Enrolled at any post-secondary institution.
- The course must be a minimum length of ten months.

### **Cynthia O'Connor Scholarship**

One scholarship of \$250 awarded annually

#### Criteria:

- Has been an active member of Girl Guides for at least two years.
- Enrolled at any post-secondary institution, no less than 60% of full time.
- Applicants must be between 17-25 years of age.

## Membership fees options



- \* **Currently** all active adult memberships are covered by Provincial Council. We are happy to support you in your role.
- \* **But**, some Guiders would prefer to pay their own membership fee. They are members and believe they should pay their own membership fee.
- \* **Therefore**, any adult member preferring to pay their membership fee may do so by paying **\$125** to their iMIS home by November 1.
- \* **Or**, you can make a donation to the Sister to Sisters Fund to cover the cost of registration for a girl member. Donations are accepted any time.

# Safe Guide

Our Guiding year is quickly coming to an end and I know most Units will be finishing off their year with a great camp or a sleep over. This means that the Safe Guide team will be busy so I ask that everyone be cognisant of getting your forms in on time.

To ensure that things go smoothly for your submission, please remember the following easy steps:

- √ Yellow level activity forms are due at least 14 days prior to the start of the activity.
- √ Red level activity forms are due 21 days prior to the activity.
- √ International travel under 72 hours now requires 30 days notification.
- √ Red level travel in Canada of 72 hours or more forms are due 30 days prior to the activity.
- √ Submit all of your forms to the Provincial Office. The minimum required is your SG.1, SG.2, SG.3 and SG.4. The office staff will log in your submission, assign it a tracking number and then send it to one of the Safe Guide Assessors for review. You will receive an email informing you of who will do the assessment and the assigned tracking number.
- √ When you correspond with your Assessor, please ensure to “reply all”. This ensures that a record of correspondence on your activity is present at the Provincial Office for future reference.
- √ Once your assessment is done and you have the go ahead, it is important to let your Assessor know if there are any changes to your activity. Life happens and things change; we all know that. However, constant communication will ensure that your activity remains compliant with Safe Guide guidelines.

Please download your forms each time from the national website to ensure that you have the most up to date version. Failure to meet deadlines will result in your activity not being assessed and therefore not taking place. Let's not disappoint our Units; get the forms in on time! Assessors are flexible but remember we are all volunteers.

The Annual General Meeting marks the end of my term as the Provincial Safe Guide Adviser for Provincial Council. I would like to thank everyone for their assistance in making my position an enjoyable one. There were a few moments, as is in any appointment, but overall I found the challenge to be a memorable one. With my great team of advisers, the great administrative assistance from the Provincial and Area Offices, and our Provincial Commissioner, the job went very smoothly. It is great to see the opportunities that Guiders are providing their Units. My successor will be **Megan Loessl** and I ask that you support her as you did me. I will continue on as a Red level Assessor and a trainer, and I may even join the Trefoil Guild so you will definitely see me around.

## Outside in a box! What is that?

In April every district received a new “program in box”. This year it is **Outside** in a box.

Ask your District Commissioner about using this Program resource in your Unit. Inside you will find a binder full of program ideas all organized and each activity will tell you what part of your program you are covering!

If the activity is a game, the pieces will be in the box so you do not have to make them. The kit includes the following categories:

- Camp skills – compass, knots, bedrolls, fire building...etc.
- Conservation – environmental awareness, tree identification...etc.

- Hikes – trail signs, scavenger hunts, hike ideas.

### **Benefits of being an Adult Volunteer at Camp Can-ta-ka-ye**

Camp will be a time for you to reconnect with yourself and to watch dreams come true.
- **Making a difference in the lives of our campers** – For many of our campers, a Can-ta-ka-ye camp is the first time they are away from home on their own. The girls are our number one priority, and with your help, we can make the Can-ta-ka-ye experience one that they will remember for the rest of their lives.
- **Help Grow Guiding in Saskatchewan** – What better way to recruit new members to Guiding than by showing them what a great time we have at camp!
- **You CAN make a difference!** – Every summer girls from across Saskatchewan travel to Can-ta-ka-ye for a chance to camp while making new friends and learning new skills in a positive girls-only environment.

### **Why are adult volunteers needed?**

- They assist by sharing their experience and skills.
- They help provide ratio as per the Safe Guide\*.
- They provide supervision for the girls during quiet times and at night.

**\*Safe Guide is the policy manual for Girl Guides of Canada.** Due to increased participation at camp combined with the requirements of Safe Guide, we need your help to continue to provide camping experiences for the girls of Saskatchewan.

### **What do adult volunteers do at Can-ta-ka-ye?**

- Adult volunteers assist with supervision of the girls throughout their time at camp.
- They are also asked to help with programmed activities, kitchen duties and swim times.
- The more volunteers we have at camp, the more relaxed everyone can be, and the more fun we can all have.

### **Can I volunteer at camp?**

Absolutely! We welcome ALL adult members of Guiding to apply to spend a camp, or two, or three with us this summer. Non-members are also welcome to join us; if they are successful in the application process they will be required to complete a police record check (PRC) and A.7.

### **What does it cost?**

At this time no fees are being charged to adult volunteers. In fact if you sign up as an adult volunteer you will be paid an honorarium in appreciation of your time. Some restrictions apply.

### **How do I apply?**

The Adult Volunteer Application Form is on the Saskatchewan website, or contact the Provincial Office for more information. Make sure your PRC is up to date and an A.7 is completed for non-members.



# Operation Earth Action

In February, the 1<sup>st</sup> Rangers in Moose Jaw ran a day event for the Sparks and Brownies for Operation Earth Action. The Rangers organized the event, preparing all the activities and supplies needed. Here is what Danielle, one of the three Rangers hosting the event, had to say.

**Who?** 1st Rangers in Moose Jaw

**What?** Operation Earth Action event for 20 Sparks and Brownies

**Why?** Our main reasons for organizing the event were we wanted to plan something for the younger girls, but also a big focus throughout planning was teaching the girls about the environment in interesting and unique ways.

**What activities did you do?** We made reusable bags out of Tim Hortons Clean-Up T-shirts and we had a round robin with three stations. These stations included:

- making lady bugs out of recycled materials
- colouring two earths, one polluted and one healthy
- writing promise sheets with things the girls promised to do to help the earth. We tied these promises into the part of the Brownie Promise where it says, "to take action for a better world", and into the Sparks Promise of "being a friend" to the earth.

We also had all the girls stand in the middle of the room and asked them various trivia questions about what can be recycled and what will or will not help the world. They then ran to either the left side of the room which was "yes" or to the right side of the room which was "no", depending on what they thought the right answer was.

At lunchtime we mapped our meal. We showed the girls from where each food item came and explained that the farther away the food comes from, the more pollution it makes.

**What was the best part of the event?** I think the best parts of event were the girls' enthusiasm plus hearing how much fun they had had and how much they had learned.

## 7 Points on Writing a GREAT Newspaper Article:



1. COMPILE all your FACTS – list all the pertinent facts and information that need to be included in the article.
2. Start with a LEAD sentence – make it simple but complete; state the topic and grab the reader's attention to interest them to read the article.
3. Give all the IMPORTANT DETAILS – include the relevant facts that relate to your LEAD statement. Include the WHAT, WHERE, WHEN, WHO & WHY. They are the focal points of the article.
4. Follow up MAIN FACTS with ADDITIONAL Information – include information to help the reader learn more: contact information, people involved, facts about the topic. This information rounds out the article.
5. Check FACTS before ENDING – check all the facts before you submit article and write accurately.
6. Remain UNBIASED – article needs to convey direct facts, not the opinion of the writer.
7. CONCLUDE your article – make it complete and finish by giving it a good concluding sentence. This is often a restatement of the LEAD statement.



All were settled in by supper, a path to the bathroom had now been shoveled through shoulder high snow courtesy of Bonnie Jean and Mary Lynne. That evening we enjoyed a beautiful Heritage sunset and later the stars drew close twinkling brightly on the snow.

Friday morning snow began to fall and the wind whipped white-outs on the lake, but we were snug and warm. We shared camp duties just as girls do and each person was responsible for one meal. Our quartermaster, Joanne Jansen, arrived later to spoil us with her culinary skills for the rest of the weekend.



The camp theme was “Hobo Camp circa 1930s”. Some activities included learning the Hobo language or code. This is a grouping of symbols used at that time by drifters and migrant workers to communicate different things to keep their own safe, fed and able to find work as they travelled across the country. We continued our ongoing service project of making quilts for the homeless. Other activities included a snowshoe hike along the lake, rainbow loom bracelets, portrait making and a unique campfire using a single large log cut in a pie shape which has been known by names such as (name a country) bonfire.

Winter tranquility lay upon the lake. A bird count revealed a few Canada Jays, chickadees, ravens and two owls. There was evidence a moose had called the site home previously before moving to new forage. Our resident squirrel in the wood shed refused to be enticed with peanuts.

Sunday we woke to six more inches of wet snow and a wintry wonderland. Time passed quickly and then it was time to pack and clean up the lodge. Farewells were said and we all left for the south and spring weather.

Reflecting upon our time at Heritage we feel that when winter conditions are more challenging, it is only more satisfying when our camp is a success. It is a special time for bonding, building friendships and making great memories for our Guild. It is our wish that more Guiding groups use this camp during the winter and share in this special experience. Our Guild is hooked on winter camping and we know you will be, too. Heritage Lake has once again worked its magic and we can't wait to return next winter.





## Cookie All Stars

May 1 is the deadline to register your Units and girls for the Cookie All Stars rewards.

**The Cookie Finder Map** has been upgraded. It is easier to use for both customers and Guiders. Improvements include the ability to see your groups' sales history, choose from a pre-populated location list, and enter multiple event dates for the one location. Be sure to allow two to three days for the information to be plotted on the map.

## Safe Guide for selling cookies

(Door-to-door, neighbourhood, malls and other public spaces)

- Guiders must manage all public sales.
- Sparks and Brownies must be accompanied to the door when selling door-to-door.
- In door-to-door sales, girls must be able to make change or have someone with them who can.
- Girls must not carry large amounts of cash.
- Plan for the following safety considerations:
  - Hazards associated with driving, walking, crossing the street and group travel along roadways, parking lots, sidewalks and in unfamiliar locations
  - Lost person or group splitting up
  - Theft
  - Hazards associated with approaching strangers: harassment, abuse, inappropriate behaviour
  - Other hazards associated with activity and environment/facility
- When planning neighborhood cookie sales' events, male relatives may participate as long as the following guidelines are followed:
  - The activity is under the overall supervision of a fully screened Responsible Guider.
  - The required ratios of adult females to girls are met.
  - Parents know the driving plan, including who is driving with whom.
  - The male's own daughter/granddaughter etc., is in the car with him at all times, i.e. must be first in and last out.



## Tips for Cookie sales

Participant should be instructed on the following:

- ✓ Courteous and effective selling
- ✓ Personal protection practices
- ✓ Boundaries and check in times
- ✓ What to do in case of emergency or lost
- ✓ How to dress appropriately for the location or weather
- ✓ Any facility specific rules
